CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

FEBRUARY AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

There were no comments during public participation at the February meeting.

District Councillor Dragon reported several items; there had been no announcement on the Local Government Reorganisation. He updated the Council that Wessex Community Assets Ltd will not be receiving funding from PDC as they did not want to accept it as a grant. The grant has therefore been withdrawn. This will not effect their work with the CCCLT. He also noted that there is £900,000 of funding available at PDC to help individual Community Land Trusts and that awarded grants could be used to pay Wessex Community Assets Ltd for advice. The District Council's budget is on PDC's agenda and Parish Councils' precepts have now been published.

There have been issues with the trial rail service between Swanage and Wareham for next year. It was suggested by a County Councillor that they may start looking into a third party contractor to run the service if Swanage Railway are unable to do it. Swanage Railway have noted the rolling stock is not ready and it was suggested there may be a 90 day service starting in September, this would not service the need in the summer months.

There has been an application to PDC for funding to help build new affordable housing in Worth Matravers. Planning permission has been granted to build 9 homes that will be specifically for those with connections to Worth. It is thought that if these are not filled Corfe parishioners will be offered the properties.

County Cllr Brooks echoed Cllr Dragons comments on LGR. She advised the Council had been expecting a decision earlier in the month but this had now been pushed back to the 23rd Feb. The 'task and finish' groups have started meeting to plan how the Council may look after reorganisation should it go ahead. The group most relevant to the Parish Council is discussing local decision making and they are meeting later in February. A decision has been made that should the new Council proceed it will be a 'District Council' with County Council functions and will be called 'Dorset Council'. Cllr Brooks reported that new health care records have been launched which aim to bring a better co-ordinated, joined up system to health services and social care. The system holds data which should eliminate duplication of work by multiple services. Other news was that the police precept has been set at 6% and that there is a consultation on what people would like to see happen at the Roman Townhouse in Dorchester.

The Council still plan to paint the equipment in the playground. It was noted in this month's inspection that some of the rubber swing seats are perishing and the Council are looking into providing replacements.

CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

The National Trust were unable to attend due to other commitments but did send a report. The Trust noted that due to logistics and health and safety concerns they intend to postpone any plans to implement a shuttle service between Norden Car Park and the village. The Parish Council object to this as historically much time and energy has been invested in realising a shuttle service. They will be responding as such to the Trust and have raised the issue with DCC. The Council have been pursuing complaints about bins outside of the Bankes Arms and whilst there was no update from the National Trust about this it was noted by Councillors that the situation had improved.

The Council discussed the New Homes for Purbeck Consultation which you will have all received through your door. They resolved not to submit a response as a Council but will do so as individuals. There is more information about the consultation on the parish Council website, along with details of drop in events that the District Council are running. The Consultation closes on the 12th of March.

The Youth Club reported they have raised over £400 in fundraising to contribute to the fees for staffing and management which the Council fund each year. They have taken part in a swim-marathon, they have donated a sum from the sale of sweets and drinks each month and Celia ran a very successful Christmas raffle.

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on the 23rd of April 2018, at 7.00pm in the Village Hall. It will be a separate meeting from the normal Council meeting and the Council are arranging a speaker to address the Parish, they plan this will be on the theme of Local Government Reorganisation.

Cllr Spicer short reported that there will soon be a defibrillator installed on the library which will bring the total to three units in the village. One defibrillator is located in the National Trust office and plans are progressing to situate this unit, or an alternative, in the Square that will be available 24hrs a day should there be an emergency. Should anyone be in need of a defibrillator call 999 and the operator will tell you the nearest unit and how to access it.

The Parish Council had no objection to proposals for the following: to replace the front door and 2 front windows on the first floor at 4 West Street, Kingston, a first floor side extension at 19 Colletts Close, Corfe Castle, Wareham. The erection of two storey side extension and alterations to elevations at Mead Cottage, 53 West Street, Corfe Castle. A first floor extension on the north elevation, to demolish part of existing store, extend store on south elevation & alterations to loggia, to excavate ground level & install oil tank and to construct a detached garden store at Sandy Hills Farm, Sandy Hill Lane and a single storey rear extension with external &

internal alterations at 7 The Lane, Kingston, Wareham .The Council had no objection to the conversion of a redundant agricultural building to a dwelling at The Old Cart Shed, Woolgarston Farm on the basis that the car parking is restricted to two vehicles as recommended.

Village Defibrillator Project Update

Hopefully many of you will have noticed that the defibrillator cabinets have been installed at the Village Library and at the Scott Arms in Kingston. There will also be a cabinet outside the National Trust ticket office in the Square very soon, and then all three will be equipped with the life-saving defibrillators they are designed to hold.

The Corfe Castle Defibrillator Project is part of the Swanage Community Defibrillator Partnership, they have provided us with much backup and advice to date, and with their help we will be organising some more familiarisation sessions with various groups around the village.

If you come across the thankfully rare situation where someone is collapsed and not breathing, be it at home or out in public, phone 999 and ask for the ambulance service. The dispatcher will advise you where the nearest defibrillator is, the code to unlock the cabinet, and will stay on the phone to help you through the process pending arrival of a paramedic.

The Parish Council would like to thank all those individuals and organisations who have made this project possible. Guardians will be checking the machines and the cabinets regularly, but if you happen to notice anything untoward please do contact our Parish Clerk, Ali Burnett (01929 426125) or Cllr Liz Spicer-Short (01929 480447).

It was with great sorrow that we learned of the sudden death of Patricia White, one of our board members, in January. We are very grateful for the support she had given and wished to continue to give to our project; she will be much missed.

The board of CCCLT is very pleased to have received a grant from Purbeck District Council which has enabled us, following a selection and tender process, to appoint an architect (Etchingham Morris) and pay for the necessary site feasibility studies. This will take us up to the planning application phase following which, if successful, we will be able to hand the project over to a housing developer. They will take the project to completion but with continuous oversight and involvement from our board.

With support and advice from Wessex CLT we have appointed the affordable housing developer Aster. They have a local office in Wareham and a track record in building several similar projects as well as experience owning and running property in Corfe Castle and the wider area.

A public meeting will be held in due course to give villagers information about the project plans and to invite comments that will help guide the final designs.

We will continue to provide updates as the project develops, both in the Corfe Valley News and on our tab in the new Corfe Castle parish council website (www.corfecastlepc.org.uk). NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

The first meeting of the Parish Council at Furzebrook took place in very luxurious surroundings for a council meeting. In your dreams! When the Clerk to the Council and Proper Officer arrived he found a whist drive taking place in the main hall. Oops! methinks a case of "double booking" or "administrative oversight". After some discussion as to what to do, the difficulty in having a parish council meeting in an echoing hall with just the slight difficulty of the Chairman and Councillors vying to be heard over the excitement of the whist drive and the fact that the Church Knowle Reading Room - always a good standby - would probably be as cold as a mortuary, the Parish Council kindly decided to have the meeting in the kitchen of the village hall. Mind you, if the meeting were to be held in the main hall I wonder if those playing whist could be included in the register of Parishioners and members of the public attending the meeting; now, that would be nice. Anyway, the huge monolith of the stainless steel kitchen table, which came up to chin level of people sitting at it, was moved into a corner and tables and chairs set up for the meeting. There wasn't much room left for people, which was just as well since only three Parish Councillors and Cllr Mrs Cherry Brookes, our County Councillor, eventually arrived to conduct the February "mini-meeting".

Let's get on with matters. Because there were three Parish Councillors present the Clerk declared the meeting quorate (just) and as usual, a chairman for the meeting was elected. Apologies and reasons for absence were read out and noted. There were no declarations of interest and nothing discussed during the public discussion period since there were no Parishioners, other than Councillors, present. It was decided to postpone discussion on the Corfe River environmental project, Dorset minerals plan, the East Creech conservation area plans by Purbeck DC, the results of the inspection of the river by Parish Council working party, the institution of the General Data Protection codes and the main budget headings for 2018-19 until the March meeting when it was hoped that the full contingent of nine Parish Councillors and some Parishioners would be present.

The minutes of January's meeting were approved and there were no matters arising.

Next up came planning matters. The Parish Councillors present decided to postpone discussions on a tree works application (TWA/2018/011) for felling of a Cypress tree at "Denora", Church Knowle as the Councillor with responsibility for trees in the Parish had been unable to attend the meeting and, consequently, it had no information available on which to base any of its decisions on the matter.

Scottish & Southern Electricity plc has applied to renew old rotting electricity poles in the area, one of which is in the Parish and one just outside (App No 6/2018/0036). Councillors decided to support the application since without the work carried out it would be likely that Parishioners might just miss their favourite television programme or be in the middle of cooking their evening meal when the lights go out and there's a lot of sparking in the neighbourhood when the poles fall over and the power lines snap or hit the ground. The work to be carried out was essential. However, they recommended that advice from Natural England should be heeded by Scottish & Southern.

The owner of the Old Blacksmith's Shop in Grange Road has applied for planning permission to open a second entrance to a nearby field (App No 6/2018/0052). Members reviewed the application and whilst they had some concerns about possible road safety, they felt that the highway authority would examine it and make recommendations accordingly. It was, therefore, decided to make no objection to the application.

There were suspicions raised about a possible unlawful development in the Parish and Councillors had received some complaints from Parishioners about the property concerned. Further information would be sought and duly passed to the PDC if the evidence warranted it.

Under past planning matters the meeting heard that the Parish Council's concerns regarding PDC's dealings with App No 6/2017.0612 were still to be discussed with the Dorset Assn of Parish & Town Councils.

Finance and administrative matters, as usual, took up a bit of time and the accounts were found to be in good order and bills were paid. The estimated precept required for 2018-19 and discussed at the last meeting was confirmed at £7,350. This increase was due to DCC no longer carrying out "non-core" highways functions and the Parish having to make arrangements to have them carried out. The webmaster's appointment for 2018-19 was confirmed, as was his small fee, to ensure that the website (churchknowleparishcouncil.gov.uk) is kept up and running and up to date, and free from ISIS, AlQuieda and other strange organisations who like to hack into websites.

The meeting heard that the playground maintenance is being carried out and authorised the purchase of essential ironmongery to facilitate repairs.

The possibility of giving Parishioners awareness "training" on the defib. Machine was discussed and put off till March. And that was that for February.

Originally from London, he was inspired by family holidays in Purbeck and sees building the public's love of nature as crucial for protecting it in the long term.

Understanding how people with different interests relate to the natural world is a key part of the process, he says.

That means opening up the conversation to involve a wider range of voices than have sometimes been heard in the past.

"For me Purbeck is a really special place and that's why I do what I do", said Tom.

"It's special because of its natural environment and without people understanding it, valuing it and having that attachment it will diminish both in importance for nature and economically."

Anyone walking the South West Coast Path between Studland and Old Harry can now literally see the wood from the trees as a 12-year-project to reinstate traditional coppicing at Warren Wood reaches the half way point.

Coppicing involves cutting back trees such as hazel almost to ground level leaving a living 'stool' in place so that fresh shoots take the place of the harvested wood.

This sustainable form of timber production is good for wildlife too because typically only one area of woodland or 'coup' is cleared each year and production thus moves around the woodland in rotation.

The result is a mix of habitats from dense woodland to open glades and everything in between, and as a result the woods are able to support a much more diverse range of plants and animals.

Warren Wood was coppiced in this way for many years until the practice died out along with many other land management traditions.

It was reinstated six years ago by the National Trust and our volunteers have cleared one coup each winter since.

This year the area closest to the South West Coast Path has been cleared and walkers who make a short detour can read about coppicing on an information panel as well as seeing it in action for the first time.

Coups coppiced in previous years would have been hidden by trees yet to be cut.

Six years in, the western side of Warren Wood has now progressively been coppiced, from back to front, and future years' work will move back along the eastern side before the cycle is repeated.

The timber is used for small scale sustainable charcoal production and other traditional purposes.





Intrepid explorer, Shirley Critchley, brought us a talk entitled 'A Saga of Sunken Secrets' which followed the life story of Lord John Montagu of Beaulieu, born in 1866. When Shirley heard that a planned feature film had been abandoned, she persuaded the family to give her access to the story. Lord John, an unconventional character, is best remembered for his promotion of the automobile (and, of course, Beaulieu is now the home of the National Motor Museum) but Shirley's talk focused on his personal life. At 23 he married his first cousin Cecily, against his family's wishes. Some years later he fell in love with his secretary, Eleanor Thornton. Eleanor is believed to be the inspiration for the Spirit of Ecstasy, the winged mascot found on every Rolls Royce. In 1915 he and Eleanor were travelling to India aboard the SS Persia when she was torpedoed by a German submarine in the Mediterranean. Most of the passengers and crew were lost, including Eleanor, but John survived, being rescued after 30 hours in a lifeboat. In 1919 Cecily died; the following year John married again.

Shirley brought us decades forward to 2006 when the 'Persia' was salvaged; she displayed some of the recovered items, including a fountain pen with a gold nib, looking almost useable after 100 years 2 miles under the sea!

Dolphin strandings

This is the time of year when dead dolphins often wash ashore along the Purbeck coast and this year is no exception. In the first half of February dead dolphins were reported from Kimmeridge, Worbarrow Bay and Ringstead with several more west of Portland. If fresh and accessible, these carcases can be taken for necropsy (post mortem) to find cause of death, although this is not always possible. Over 100 years of recording and research in the UK has revealed a variety of threats to these animals and in some cases enabled protection measures to be put in place. If you spot a dead dolphin on the beach please report it as quickly as possible giving the exact location, date/time and condition of the animal. A photo is extremely useful. 





The Reverend Ian Jackson writes:

The beginning of Lent appeared to get a lot of attention this year – no doubt due to it being on February 14th! But also, because giving up something for Lent or, alternatively, doing something positive and extra has become deeply embedded in our shared tradition; this is still taken up by many regardless of the specific link with the seasons of the Church's Year.

I noticed several newspaper articles speaking positively about Lent in a variety of ways – living more simply and/or doing positive acts of kindness and goodness each day for the 40 days. (There are 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Easter if you leave out the Sundays – they are not kept as fast days.)

It was interesting that the various articles and comments were written by people of no professed faith, or from different faith backgrounds. This enhanced the fact that Lent is being observed by people from many backgrounds and so it has a very unifying effect. Such things are always good.

In the Diocese of Salisbury our 3 bishops have given us each a small booklet to use each day in Lent. There is a short reading from St. Mark's Gospel, a reflection, a prayer and a suggestion for action. There should still be a few copies around in the churches; help yourself if you would like one. This is a particular way of linking with the Christian faith and doing so in the company of others, not just those we know well and see, or hear from, regularly. Again, a good thing.

The message of Good Friday and Easter is about God acting and working to unite his people. Good Friday reminds us of the cost of this. At Easter we celebrate the renewing of life which is God's gift and act among us.

God renews life throughout the great variety of people, places and communities within his creation. The richness of this diversity is not taken away but deepened and enhanced.

In a special way this year the beginning of Lent anticipated the 'end' of the season. Perhaps that's not surprising. I have n't mentioned Valentine's Day there's hardly need. Christian faith is that all human love is sustained by that love which is at the heart of all creation, God's own love; the love described by Gerard Manley Hopkins as that which moves the sun, the moon and the stars.

May Lent, Holy Week and Easter be good and positive times for everyone.





We are all in some ways the same, we are different!

I am an avid Social Media user, from Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Messenger, WordPress, Blogging and Pinterest...and there are more.

For me they are simply a modern way of advertising or disseminating thoughts, ideas, encouragement and yes challenges to myself as I read what I 'post.'

But sometimes as I scroll through the posts of 'friends' or 'followers' I can hear myself asking why did that person post that, why is that so interesting and other such questions. Today as I was thinking what to write it suddenly dawned on me, others no doubt (with some justification) think the same about some (a lot) of what I write!

You see we are all, in one way exactly the same. We all have one trait that crosses generations, cultures and every form of diversity. We are uniquely the same in that we are all.....different!

One person's passion is another's boredom, one person's humour is another's rocky ground. We are different. For some reason however, in church, we sometimes feel as if we should be the same, all liking hymns or choruses, sitting or standing even down to the biscuits we serve and the flowers we display.

But we are all uniquely made and the bible has much to say about and rejoice in this.

Psalm 139:13-14 "You made all the delicate, inner parts of my body and knit me together in my mother's womb. Thank you for making me so wonderfully complex!"

It also has a lot to say about our God who came, and comes to us, in our mess, hurt, celebrations, confusions that is life. From the Woman at the Well (John 4:1 - 42) the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11 - 32) and more, God comes to us where we are. God left the majesty of heaven to come to us.

During this period of Lent we are also reflecting on the God who came to us, in Jesus at Christmas, into such a fallen world that He was prepared to be executed, for us, on a cross that we might know the length and depth and love of God.

Yet so often I think we 'in church' expect people to come to us, in *our* traditions, in our hymns and *our* way instead of 'taking and being' church where people are.

Graciously over the years God has allowed me to experience and be involved in different types of church. I was saved in a wonderful Anglican Church, served in Holiness and independent churches. I have been part of the church on a beach, in a restored housing block in Ukraine, in community centres, universities, schools and public squares. I have experienced traditional worship in Ukrainian, Swahili and Korean, forms of Taize worship and most incredibly... authentic Maasai worship. And because God has a sense of humour have been used to start churches in Coffee Shops and closed churches, and those specifically for people with learning difficulties and a church only for those aged 11 - 15 years. God is creative, God comes to us in our uniqueness and I believe wants us to do the same. After all the churches of Corinth, Jerusalem and Ephesus were not all the same.

So in the months ahead we will occasionally be trying different things. From evening fellowships with snacks on the 5th Sunday of the month (for those who can't make Sunday mornings), creative prayer Saturdays and more.

Our Christian faith can be explored in so many ways, our worship in so many styles but in every case it is about trying to be **real** people, connecting to a **real** God in **real** life.

We were made uniquely different we simply look to celebrate those differences with the God who made them all.




