SEPTEMBER AT THE PARISH COUNCIL

Worth Matravers Parish Council have asked the District Council to consider whether some of the Hill Bottom houses (the southern side of Kingston) should be moved from this Parish into Worth Matravers. The properties in Hill Bottom get road access from Worth Matravers and are geographically much closer to that village than Kingston. As part of the necessary consultation, the Parish Council gave approval for the change subject to the wishes of the residents involved and agreement on the replacement boundary line.

The Council considered the proposals by Purbeck District Council for revised settlement boundaries for both Corfe Castle and Kingston. Councillors decided the proposals were on the whole unnecessary bureaucracy and money wasted and this will be the Council response to the District Council.

The benches removed from around the Cross monument in the Square will be replaced on the pavement against the buildings between the Bakery and the Greyhound.

The playground open topped litter bins were removed in the week prior to the Council Meeting by SITA at no cost to the Parish. SITA decided to stop emptying these litter bins on health and safety grounds. There was no contract for the emptying of these bins so SITA were not being paid for the work. The Dorset Waste Partnership have agreed the covered double bin by the Youth Shelter will continue to be emptied as part of the existing village contract (at no cost to the Parish). The Members decided to review the situation in the near future to see if there is a problem with litter. The removal of the old bins does not preclude new litter bins being purchased at a later date by the Parish Council but this cost and the cost of emptying them would be a new burden on the Council. Councillors are looking for earth to fill the holes where the base of the old bins were inset into the ground.

By the time you are reading this, Southern Electric Contracting (SEC) should be well into the installation of new street lighting on behalf of the County Council. The proposals were agreed this time last year and I think it useful to repeat my report now. They show heritage lighting in the northern part of West Street that matches the style of the heritage lighting in the Square. These lamps are from the range known as Urbis Abbey and are a flat glass traditional lantern shape. A couple of the other lights at the far end of West Street will be replaced with standard light fittings but these will be painted black rather than the normal grey. The heritage lighting in

East Street will be of a different design known as Urbis Albany although on the same design of column where they are not building mounted. The Albany fitting looks a bit like an upturned dinner plate and provides more light to meet the strict County Council guidelines for a main road situation. There will be a few more lights in East Street than currently exists in order to provide the minimum lighting standard. Some of the lighting in the southern sections of both West Street and East Street are not being replaced this time round as they are considered to still have a useful remaining life.

There will be a formal handover of the Village Library to the Friends by Dorset County Council at 2pm on Monday, 30th September. Mr Edward Fox will be present for the event. Please get in touch with Councillor Finch if you want to know any more or if you want to help with the library.

The Council considers all planning applications and submits comments to the District Council. The Parish Council had no objection to a proposal for the following: The removal of an existing gas heater and the plugging of an existing flue, the installation of new gas heaters and flues on north and south elevation walls at the Congregational Church, 44 East Street, Corfe Castle.

The Council objected to an application by Infrastrata plc to allow temporary planning permission for the construction of a wellsite, with associated portable cabins for the storage of equipment and for staff accommodation, the drilling of an exploratory borehole, the undertaking of production tests and the retention of the site and wellhead valve assembly gear for evaluation of a conventional hydrocarbon reservoir at California Quarry, Swanage. The Council has serious concerns about this proposal for the possible extraction of 2.8 billion cubic metres of gas and 2.4 million tonnes of oil via a wellsite in this location. The objection is on the grounds that it will increase traffic on the already overcrowded A351 and bring vibration, noise, smell, diesel exhaust fumes and other environmental damage to Corfe Castle village. We note the traffic management plan rules out use of the Sandbanks to Studland ferry route on the grounds of conservation and yet dismisses problems in Corfe Castle as being just a few more hgy movements.

The Council will be objecting to the formal pre-application by Navitus Bay Development Ltd to construct and operate the Navitus Bay Wind Park, Isle of Wight. However, this can only be commented on by using the phase four consultation from Navitus as it is a pre-application consultation request to Purbeck District Council.

Any resident who has previously commented on the Navitus proposals or who has strong feelings about the construction of the wind turbines in Poole Bay should make their opinion known again as the Council understands all former comments do not count for the purposes of this final round of consultation.

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
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NEWS FROM CHURCH KNOWLE PARISH COUNCIL

Wow! Five Parishioners and members of the public were in attendance at September's CKPC meeting held in Church Knowle village hall. Was it something, perhaps, to do with the nice new tables or <u>relatively</u> comfy chairs with integral cushions? Alas, no. There were, however, two planning applications, one of which proved a little controversial, to be discussed and the people in the "public gallery" had personal and professional interest in those. It really would be so nice to have a few more attendees at the meetings; they're not that boring and can even be as interesting (sometimes) as the late night Wednesday wrestling matches, introduced by Kent Walton, which one used to see on Southern Television all those years ago! And another thing, bodies in a hall do raise the temperature a bit and that means the Clerk wouldn't have to feed the electricity meter so often.

The meeting began with Cllr Parker (Chairman) welcoming all to the meeting and opened the public discussion period which went on for the best part of an hour, concentrating on a planning application to demolish "Southfield" in Bucknowle and replace it with a new dwelling whilst re-landscaping the surrounding garden and grounds. The architect for the developers gave a short presentation about the project (six years in the making), and a "question and answer" session and discussion followed. There was concern amongst the attendees about the damage likely to be caused during the expected 9 months of work to the private road, maintained by a local farmer, by the demolition and construction lorries, etc. There was also concern about the ability of the current private water supply, sewerage and drainage to cope with the new development. Councillors and Parishioners were also concerned about the proposals for "re-housing" the bats and also had general environmental and design concerns. Concern was raised about an apparent planning condition, made in the 1950s, which required an existing building to be demolished if permission be granted for building the now existing house (which would be demolished if the current planning application were to be successful). That planning condition had never been met. Following the discussion, the architect and developer were left in no doubt about the concerns of neighbours and local residents about the plans, and the Vicechairman and Chairman commented that, perhaps, better communications from the architect and developer to neighbours, etc., should have occurred during the "pre-planning" stages. The Chairman thanked the architect for his presentation and explained that the matter would come up for formal discussion later in the meetina.

Next up in the public participation bit came "Clayfields", Church Knowle. This was a fairly un-controversial application to put in double-glazing, change doors and put natural wood cladding on the top half of the house. The owner explained what she wanted to do and was quizzed by Members about the type of wood and finish. Satisfied, Members then went on to the main business meeting. There were no formal declarations of interest by Councillors and following the "as usual"

couple of typographical errors the Minutes of the August meeting were duly approved and signed.

The "Southfield" application then came up for formal discussion and the plans were examined again in depth, Councillor Bugler who had examined the plans in depth, taking the lead in explaining the development proposals further to Members. They decided that whilst they had no overall objection to the proposed development, they had concerns about damage to the lane and about the size and position of the new garage – they felt it should have a lower roof height and be built lower down the hillside. They also had concerns about the ability of the existing sewerage system to cope with the new house, etc., and also commented on the apparent lack of provision for rainwater and surface drainage and their concerns about the adequacy of the water supply.

Councillors then went on to consider the "Clayfields" planning application. After examination, they gave their support to the applicants and they had no objection to the work to be carried out.

Following this, there was an application for a memorial to be sited on a grave. It's always a rather poignant point in the meeting when such applications are considered, for obvious reasons. Councillors decided that the proposed memorial was suitable to the memory of the deceased parishioner and gave permission for the stone to be fitted.

A blanket tree preservation order has been issued by PDC for the site at 162 Furzebrook Road. Councillors heard that most of the trees that had been there had already been cut down but the Clerk explained the order had been made to protect the remainder. There was then discussion about protection of trees adjacent to the site and the Clerk was asked to secure a "TPO" for that area too.

The caravan's back on the land behind what remains of the Grange Road notice board. With luck, by the time the next edition of CVN comes out the caravan will be gone and the new notice board will have been put up. Wouldn't that be rather nice! Anyway, the CKPC is going to "Victor Meldrew" PDC, yet again, about the ubiquitous beekeeper's caravans and the planners' lack of backbone in getting it removed.

The meeting was told by DCC Cllr Lovell that Perenco has (at last) been granted oil well extension of use permissions on the old BP sites until 2027 and 2037. On another energy subject, the Clerk presented yet another bundle of paper from the developers of the Swanage Bay (alias Navitus Bay) electricity generating wind farm project for comment. This, apparently, according to the Navitus people, is the last opportunity for locals to comment on the proposals. Have they not yet heard about the process of public consultation by the planning authorities, or even public enquiries, once their formal application has been submitted? Obviously not. Perhaps they are so convinced of their status in the world and their ability to walk on water, which they opine their application will get the go-ahead without so much as a squeak from the "powers that be" – the local ones, anyway. Councillors decided to review the proposals, yet again, and make comment. They would also

attend the "workshops and exhibitions" put on by the developers. One of the Councillors commented that such exhibitions, where the public come and go in dribs and drabs is a very good way of diluting comment and/or opposition because instead of Navitus going into the "lions' den" of the public, it's the other way round. Wouldn't it be nice if we all could invoice Navitus for the time and effort we (in councils or as individuals) have spent in giving advice, etc. to the company? We'd all be millionaires – a bit like the Navitus directors – and parish precepts would be things of the past!

Next up came highways. Problems have occurred regarding maintenance of fire hydrants in Furzebrook Road where plastic coverings are assisting the undermining of the road. The Clerk advised he would contact Wessex Water. The Badgers of Bucknowle came up again. Indeed, they're coming up quite regularly from their hole in the ground, along with half the sand and soil of the Parish! The road undermining was reported as getting worse and the Clerk told Members that DCC were "working on it". It was unanimously felt, however, that the attitude of DCC highways department appeared to be to sit back, do nothing about road hazards and "play the fiddle" until someone gets killed. Unless, of course, when the Army wants to put up road closure information signs at Corfe & Steeple and DCC refuses them permission because the lettering might be 1mm smaller than "standard requirements" or there is "too much information".

The Clerk was pleased to report that the finances were in good order and that he hoped the notice boards would be up soon following "discussions" with the contractors. He managed to get a 10% price reduction because of the serious delays.

The Chairman reported on a meeting the Parish Council had with Margaret Green Animal Sanctuary and Raglan. Heads had been knocked together and it would seem that as soon as final planning permission is given (and, of course, PDC's illustrious Conservation Officer is satisfied) the building will start and we might have some real affordable homes in Church Knowle for Church Knowle Parish families next year. Absolutely fabulous. Good things come to those who wait, but not for too long. There was a long discussion about the length of time needy people had been kept waiting by those who, presumably, had no immediate need for affordable homes themselves and how it seems to take so long to get things done these days. The Council already has three local CK parish families interested and waiting and if others are interested they should contact the Clerk or Chairman to formally express interest.

Apart from minor correspondence, that was that for the September meeting. Next meeting will be at Furzebrook Village Hall on 08th October at 7.30 p.m. (Assuming, of course that the Clerk has remembered to book it!)

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

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September Meeting: Moira Purver, Sculptor

Who could have guessed that there was so much to learn about the processes of creating a relatively small piece of sculpture? Moira's talk was spell-binding as she described the methods she uses starting with an armature made of bendy wire which needs to be covered in exciting layers (including car filler!) before the modelling clay can be applied. We saw how her entrancing Argentine Tango Dancers began as naked, muscular torsos and were then dressed in their dance clothes and meticulously modelled from life. And then comes the casting, a painstaking and brilliant process invented thousands of years ago to create bronze figures. We learned about other, less expensive materials such as resins of bronze, marble, iron and slate as we passed round a series of little models of a man, frog, pig, and cats, each one individually pattinated. Moira described how she was inspired as a teenager to make her first piece of sculpture, a self portrait bust, but was unable to be a fulltime sculptor until fairly recently, since when she has achieved huge success and exhibited her work at home and abroad. We are very grateful to Moira for bringing so many of her sculptures and sharing her passion with us. Don't miss the National Trust Sculpture Trail this winter in Corfe where we can see more of Moira's beautiful work.

NEW ARRIVALS – Last month during one of our rock pooling events marine warden, Emma Godden, spotted a cluster of cuttlefish eggs washed ashore in the strandline. Emma said 'I felt like a proud mother when they hatched. It is fascinating to watch them grow and interact with one another.' Left out in the sun the cuttlefish would have dried out and died. In a bid to save them, the eggs were put in one of the tanks at the marine centre where they were carefully monitored and looked after. Several weeks later lots of tiny stone coloured baby cuttlefish appeared! Cuttlefish have specialised skin cells that enable them to change colour and perfectly camouflage themselves with their background. This year around 25 cuttlefish have been successfully reared and are gradually being released back into the bay once big enough. Populations of cuttlefish have fluctuated a lot over the years but it is great to see that the species is still reproducing in the local area. There are still several newly hatched babies and some eggs left to grow in the centre so hurry down to Kimmeridge before the end of the month to see them. Also, make sure you keep an eye on our website for upcoming events this October half term.

The summer at the Fine Foundation Marine Centre at Kimmeridge has been very busy, with a variety of events and activities. With thanks to the glorious weather this year it has been ideal conditions for both the kayak safaris and snorkel trail. The kayak safari tours have now been running for 3 years and we have had some great feedback from our customers. The glass bottom kayaks enable users to see beneath the waves into the shallows of the bay, whilst staying relatively dry. There is a diversity of colourful life at Kimmeridge and both the snorkel trail and kayaks are great ways to experience it. Both will be running again next summer for those keen to explore.

Did you know?

LESSONS LEARNT

Spanning the centuries of local history and architectural styles, the old and new school building stand hand in hand, interestingly in stark contrast, demonstrating changing times. In the 19th Century – 1895, the foundation stone of the Bankes Memorial School was laid on 20th May by Lady Charlotte Bankes.



From the archives: The Bankes Memorial School. The laying of the Foundation Stone by Lady Charlotte Bankes, 20th May 1895.

This new school was opened in November 1895 and lessons began on 6th January 1896. The original old school building (built 1834 and now RBL Club) had become inadequate for many reasons. The ground floor continued to be used by the infant school and the upper floor, for Parish meetings. The vears 1963-97. in the 20th **Century,** are recorded, specifically, in a document: 'Corfe Castle School - A Personalised History during its Final Years as a Primary

School, as related by Ted Hopkins, Headmaster'. Dorothy Hopkins (widow of the late Ted Hopkins) and herself a former teacher at the School, passed on to me, Ted's files which I occasionally dip into and refer to in these columns. I remember someone asking me a few years ago, if I knew what VC stood for on the former signage of the School Board and still relevant. The answer is in this document and I think worth repeating at this appropriate time of focus on Corfe Castle School. "The Bankes Memorial School was under the aegis of The National Society until 1948. In December 1948, at a public meeting in Corfe Castle, attended by 22 people, a vote was taken, with 15 in favour (2 against) of 'Controlled' status. At the end of the 2 hour meeting, the letter was signed by School correspondent, Paget Bowyer. The point of a voluntary controlled school (VC) is that the LEA is responsible for total funding, whereas the Church, as the original provider of the School, retains a small number of Foundation Governors. They are responsible for seeing that this Foundation is respected. The School is greatly indebted to Mr. Bowyer and other local people, for their foresight at that momentous meeting in 1948. In 1997, the Primary School became Corfe

Castle First School, CE VC, with the introduction of the Middle Schools". The Chairman and Governors of the School, retain our respect, support and appreciation for their voluntary dedicated contribution to the continued success of Corfe Castle Primary School. Now in the 21st Century, another big day dawns in the School's timeline. Friday, 4th October marks the official opening of the School extension building. The invitation from the Corfe Castle Primary School, in the September CVN, welcomes all at 1.30pm to this Open Day. In support of this occasion, readers were asked for memorabilia and recollections.

WHEN I WAS 8

I was surprised, recently, in a telephone call from my nephew in Sydney, Australia, in which he said that he had been reading the Corfe Valley News on the internet, about the School and, subsequently, emailed me a few lines on his memories as follows: "My time at Corfe Castle School, during my one year living in Corfe Castle (academic year 1969/70) when I was 8 years old, was one of the most impressionable years and a highlight of my childhood. I remember there was an unusually large amount of pupils from other countries - maybe I over estimate! - but I remember Mrs. Dodd had flags of the different countries painted on paper and displayed on the classroom wall. Amongst them,

of course, there was the Australian flag for me!, the American flag for David Levine and also a Danish flag but I can't remember the name of the pupil. Mrs. Dodd, to me, was a wonderful teacher and Mr. Hopkins the best headmaster in my school life. I remember being pleasantly surprised the first time I had lunch at school. It was a hot meal with mashed potatoes! In Australia, my school lunch was always sandwiches and fruit, out of a lunchbox prepared by mum and eaten, whilst sitting around the playground with friends. It was the contrast that surprised me - with the orderly marching of pupils over the road to eat a meal at school. It seemed strange but pleasantly so. I remember Mum and Dad telling us (my 2 brothers, sister and myself) before we set sail for the 1 year in England, that the weather will not be so good for playing outside all the time. However, maybe it was exceptional that year as my abiding childhood memory is of playing outside on The Halves, on the swings behind Granny's and Eileen's house. As an 8 year old, I remember the Village was full of children to play with. I was fascinated in learning about the history of the Village as part of my school work. The Village seemed very large and the walk from home to School seemed such a long way (from 38 East Street!). On a return visit to the Village 22 years later, it all looked very similar but I was staggered to realise how small it

really was. My year living in Corfe Castle was such a wonderful time it will forever be in my memory." From: Tony Nettleton, Sydney, born UK 1961 and the same year to Australia. Hopefully, a photograph of the class of 69/70 will reproduce well enough for these pages. Were you one of Tony's playmates? As a point of interest, the Book 'Corfe Castle 2000, A Diary of the Village' page December 21st, explains more of that year in Corfe Castle.







<u>The Reverend Anne Bond writes:</u> at very short notice, but - when in doubt, talk about the weather ...

When I was in my late twenties and early thirties I lived in Italy for five years. I had an eccentric and short-tempered husband (not Michael!), a two year old daughter and a baby son. Our house was an isolated, ancient, thick-walled ex-chestnut-mill with very little electricity and minimal plumbing, and it was in a valley half way up a small mountain, with the nearest village twenty minutes' steep climb away. For the first summer I washed clothes in the stream, cooked over an open fire and learnt to do the shopping in almost non-existent Italian. You do that sort of thing without worrying about it when you're young.

That first summer was very hot. My then-husband hired a pantechnicon and went back to England to fetch our furniture, and while he was away the weather changed. The clear blue skies clouded over and the air became oppressively heavy and still. You could hear people talking up in the village. The birds stopped singing and went to bed. Everything seemed to be holding its breath. Then there was a cat's paw of wind, the dry grass rustled, the heavens opened and rain fell in a solid sheet, bouncing high off the ground and making a sharp metallic smell of wet dust and stone rise off the earth. In minutes it was dark as night, thunder rumbled round the hilltops and we began to see forked lightening. There was an enormous, noisy and frightening storm, what electricity we had went out, and we discovered the entire roof leaked, in every single room. I lit all the candles we possessed and stuck them onto windowsills, and the children and I sat around a roaring fire of the baby's tinder-dry and odourless disposable nappies it had been too dry to burn previously because of the fire-risk.

But the next morning the world sparkled as if it had been newly washed and polished, the sun shone in a cloudless innocent blue sky, and the only sign of the night's storm was the stream in front of the house which was double the width it had been, and, brown and boiling, galloped past at the rate of knots.

Whilst living in Italy I learnt to enjoy whatever the weather threw at me, mostly because it was so beautiful. Rumour has it that the autumn following the lovely summer we have just had will be wet and blustery, and the winter hard and cold – so we need to be prepared. But does it matter? Well, yes – I think it does. If we are to take our Christian beliefs and values seriously, we will make a conscious effort to keep a weather-eye on our nearest neighbours, so we are all ready to help each other if the need arises. Also, if we're prepared for the worst, when the weather comes we will be able

to see it in all its glory, without fear but with appreciation; and we'll be able to thank God for the magnificence and beauty and power of his wonderful creation.

Dear Friends,

It is amazing what some people will do for the benefit and welfare of others, and to the saving of many lives. Take, for instance, a young boy named Sam who lived near the docks at Bristol many years ago. Sam would spend hours on the

dockside watching the hundreds of ships going in and out, day-dreaming about all the far away places and exotic destinations, and wondering what cargo was being taken out and brought back, just dreaming that perhaps one day he might be on one of those ships.

When Sam was about fifteen years of age, he started logging the ships by name and size as they left and returned. After a while, he began to wonder why so many names were missing, he dared to go down to the dockside and ask amongst troubled crew members why the discrepancy. They soon let him know of the awful conditions of most of the shipping, the disrepair, the overload and general unseaworthiness, scores of ships were being lost at sea meaning hundreds of lives were lost. Human lives seemed to be valueless as rich shipping owners made huge amounts of money.

Sam was determined to do something about it, he started writing letters, then a little booklet setting out his logging of the ships, and the loss of so many, until an MP raised the matter in Parliament, but because so many MP's were part of the shipping industry, the matter was soon squashed.

So Sam, now 30 years of age, thought there was only one thing to do, stand for Parliament himself. He was so popular that he won his seat with a huge majority. His maiden speech was electric, and this is a paragraph from that speech:

"Every year hundreds and hundreds of men are sent to sea in these coffin ships, many of them losing their lives, wives are made widows, children are made fatherless, and why? So that many scoundrels who have no love for God, or respect for man, can get rich". Parliament was in uproar, Sam would not withdraw his accusations, but he stood his ground and won the day, and from that date a Certificate of Sea Worthiness has to be affixed to the ship and by order of Parliament, a plimsoll line would have to be shown on every ship to show maximum weight carrying load.

Today, all over the world every ship must have a Certificate of Sea Worthiness, and show their plimsoll line. The boy's name was Sam Plimsoll. From those early days of day-dreaming to the completion of his mission, he saved the lives of thousands. Ship owners hated him, sailors loved him. Today on Victoria Embankment in London there is a monument to Samuel Plimsoll.

Today in our Christian Faith we honour the Lord Jesus Christ who died so that many might live in Him, His Cross is the emblem of our Christian Faith, and a sign of one who loved us so much, He did something about it. The Cross – for you and me.

From the Rev.Barry Walton, the minister-to-be of the Evangelical Congregational Church in Corfe Castle.

Until an hour ago, Chris and I, and our furniture, were due to arrive at the Manse on the 25th October, but now it looks as if our furniture will need to be left behind in Okehampton because of work that needs to be done on the manse before we are able to move in. However, three things haven't changed.

The first, is that I am still really looking forward to coming and living in Corfe Castle, and having the opportunity of once again becoming the minister, or pastor, if you prefer that title, of a fellowship of those who seek to worship God and make known his love to all those who are ready to receive it.

The second thing that hasn't changed, is that my induction is still at 2.00pm on Saturday, the 2nd.November, and my first service will be on the following day at 10.30am. I am really hoping and praying that there will be those in Corfe Castle who don't normally go to Church, who will come and see what the experience is like, and not judge us by what it used to be like when they were children, or by what they think it is like now. I am also wondering if there are those who live in Corfe Castle, but go to church in Wareham or Swanage. Why travel ten miles, when what you want to receive in terms of fellowship and feeding, is available on your door step?

The third thing that hasn't changed, is that here in Okehampton the process of getting ready for the move must still continue. I couldn't believe it when my wife, in clearing out a cupboard, found wedding presents that we received 52 years ago that have never been used! The process that we are going through at the moment is very interesting, because it makes you re-evaluate what is important and what needs to be kept as compared with what can be disposed of. What value do we put on things, and what value do we put on relationships?

Saying good-bye to our friends in Okehampton isn't going to be easy. Each week I take two Prayer and Bible Study Groups and we have grown very close to those who attend these gatherings each week. The sugar on the pill, is that we believe that we are following God's guidance, and that, as we leave behind our friends in Okehampton, there are those in Corfe Castle who will become our friends in the future.

Hoping to make friends with those of you who are willing to take hold of the outstretched hand.

The attendance was good and, after an excellent presentation by the design team, including a very impressive depiction of the inside of the museum (shown in your recent newsletter), a useful discussion took place with many airing their views candidly. The meeting then voted on whether the design should be put forward for planning permission, with 29 in favour, 0 against, and 4 abstentions. The archaeological 'dig' is now completed with nothing of huge significance being found. It was interesting to see the number of people who stopped by the notice board and watched what was going on. Obviously there is a great deal of interest.

<u>Locomotive Brings Historic Narrow Gauge Industrial Steam Trains Back</u> <u>To Purbeck – For The First Time In 60 Years!</u>

History was made earlier in September at the Norden ball clay mine museum Corfe Castle when a small locomotive brought narrow gauge industrial steam trains back to the Isle of Purbeck – for the first time in 60 years.



Enabling the historic first since 1953 to take place is a narrow gauge steam locomotive, named 'Emmet', which has been built on the chassis of a German 1930s industrial diesel locomotive that hauled trains at a ball clay mine at Norden, near Corfe Castle, from the 1940s through to 1970.

It was in 1953 – the year of Her Majesty the Queen's Coronation in London – that a steam locomotive last ran on the Pike Brothers Fayle & Company narrow gauge industrial railway system serving ball clay mines around Furzebrook, between Wareham and Corfe Castle.

Purbeck Mineral and Mining Museum chairman Peter Sills said: "This is the culmination of ten years – and more than 30,000 hours – hard work by the Purbeck Mineral and Mining Museum volunteers who have built the Norden clay mine from scratch on the site of the old Victorian ball clay works demolished during the 1970s. The running of the first steam-hauled narrow gauge ball clay trains in the Isle of Purbeck since 1953 – the year of our Queen's Coronation – is an incredible moment that I honestly thought I would never see. It's really tremendous and very historic."

Haylock class 0-4-0 wheel arrangement tank locomotive 'Emmet' was built in 2003 for running on the Moors Valley Railway at Ashley Heath in Dorset and named after a pet cat who lived on the Moors Valley Railway.

'Emmet' was built on a chassis that came from a 1930s narrow gauge German diesel shunter that worked at the Kiel Docks before being shipped to England after the Second World War for a new working life hauling ball clay trains at



the Norden clay mines from the late 1940s to 1970 when the lines were closed and lifted for scrap.

Also on display at the Purbeck Mineral and Mining Museum, but not running, was the historic Victorian narrow gauge saddle tank steam locomotive No. 542 'Cloister' built by Hunslet of Leeds in 1891 for the Dinorwic

slate quarry – once the largest slate quarry in the world – at Llanberis in north Wales a cost of £500.

The Purbeck Mineral and Mining Museum at Norden is open from 11am to 5pm, Friday to Sunday, 6 to 8 September, 2013, with admission free – although donations are welcome to help fund continuing preservation and development. 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
