CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

Memorial Garden: Losing a loved one is already a challenging experience, and the added financial burden of arranging a burial or memorial can be overwhelming for many families. Recognising this, the Parish Council has been exploring options over the past several months to develop a memorial garden in the cemetery. This proposed area, located near the new Oak Tree, is unsuitable for burials due to the tree's future root system.

The envisioned memorial garden would feature a serene seating area for personal reflection and a dedicated space for scattering ashes. Additionally, it would offer families an affordable way to honour their loved ones with a memorial. The Parish Council values your feedback on this project, whether positive or negative. Please share your thoughts by emailing the clerk at clerk@corfecastleparishcouncil.gov.uk.

Annual Parish Meeting: Last month, we introduced a new style for our Annual Parish Meeting. The event lasted a couple of hours, allowing residents to come and go as they pleased while visiting various stallholders around the room. The Youth Club was also present, generously serving free tea, coffee, and biscuits, and even handling the clean-up afterwards. Thank you, Youth Club! The evening concluded with a brief twenty-minute talk from the Vice Chairman, who discussed the achievements and future plans of the Parish Council. Save the date Monday 12th May 2025, doors open from 5.30pm with the formal presentation from the Council at 6.30pm.

Annual Governance & Accountability Return (AGAR): The AGAR is a legal financial document the Parish Council must complete each year, and present to the external auditor for examination. Part of the process is to ensure residents are aware they have the right to inspect the Parish Council's accounts, during a specified period of time. This year the "Notice of public rights and publication of unaudited annual governance & accountability return" for the accounting period year ended 31 March 2024 in line with the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014 Sections 26 and 27, The Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015 (SI 2015/234) will commence on the 11th June and run until the 22nd July.

Citizens Advice Bus: Over the past few months, the Citizens Advice Bus has been visiting Corfe Castle. Unfortunately, attendance has been lower than expected, putting the service at risk of closure. However, Citizens Advice is committed to giving it one final effort before making a decision. The bus will now be located in the resident's car park by the toilet block and will be available on the third Friday of every month from 1 pm to 3 pm. Regardless of the issue, big or small, please stop by and say hi to Tracey.

Village Hall Kitchen Regeneration: Last month, a Village Hall Representative presented the kitchen regeneration project to the Parish Council. The Parish Council expressed their support for this initiative and wished the trustees success with the project.

Swanage Railway: Frank Roberts (Swanage Railway Trust, Chairman) and Gavin Johns (Swanage Railway Company, Chairman), attended the Council's monthly meeting. During COVID-19, the Swanage Railway lost many customers, and it has been challenging to return to pre-pandemic levels. Inflation and the rising cost of operations, especially coal, which doubled overnight due to the Ukraine crisis has added further pressures to both the railway and customers. Last year, the railway faced difficult times and required a £750,000 cash injection.

In response, a new business plan was created, resulting in a few redundancies, which were managed through retirements. The plan shifted the railway's focus from public transport to events and tourism, leading to the organization of more largescale events. It was stated that late-night events are not expected to be regular events. The business model is proving successful, with current figures showing progress ahead of the plan, but the Swanage Railway Board is open to new ideas on ways to continue to improve the service.

Train service to Wareham: it was noted that it cost £120,000 to run and was not cost-effective. The Swanage Railway would be willing to continue the service but requires financial support, particularly if the £2 single bus fare remains. Partial Derailment: During the Diesel Gala, the rear diesel engine partially derailed whilst coming slowly into Corfe Castle Station. The Accident Incident Board was contacted and took control, approving the engine's removal overnight to the siding. The railway noted this may have disturbed some residents and for that they send their apologies. The Rail Accident Investigation Board concluded an external investigation was not required; however, the Swanage Railway is undertaking a full internal review, and the aim is to finish the report in a matter of weeks. Swanage Railway were asked if they would consider providing a shuttle between Purbeck Park and Corfe Castle. Swanage Railway is keen to investigate this service, stating ideally the cost of the journey to Corfe Castle would be paid for in the cost of the parking ticket (Park and Ride). The Swanage Railway is happy to work with Corfe Castle Parish Council and Dorset Council on this idea. It was suggested Corfe Castle Parish Council provide some suggested dates and times as to when a trail service may be run.

Dorset Council: Last month we asked Cllr Wilson to investigate a number of issues, here are the results:

Traffic issues: A351 during the recent road works by Castle Mound. Cllr Wilson spoke to Dorset Council regarding this matter and is hopeful moving forward there are opportunities for a closer working relationship between Highways and Cllr Wilson where residents access will be priority.

Mobility access around the parish: Cllr Wilson recently met with the resident who initially raised this issue and will give a full report shortly.

Halves footpath: Cllr Wilson is meeting with the Dorset Council Head Ranger for Purbeck and will report back.

Next Council Meeting: Monday 8th July 2024, at 7pm in the Corfe Castle Village Hall, Bill Carter Room. To start the meeting is a public half hour, so please come and join us and have your say.

Church Knowle Parish Council - June Meeting

The June meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Furzebrook Village Hall on Tuesday 11th June 2024 at 6:30pm. It was attended by five members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair), three members of the public and the newly elected South East Purbeck ward councillor Ben Wilson

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Vacancies on the Parish Council

There is now only one vacancy on the council which has a full strength of nine and any interested parishioners can apply to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk.

The Playing Field

The playing field opposite the Margaret Green Animal Sanctuary is owned and run by the Parish Council. It has been reported by households close to the filed that there has been disturbing bad behaviour by adults in the field, drinking and riding on the equipment. Measures to discourage this are being considered so that people in the vicinity can have the quiet enjoyment of their properties.

Neighbourhood Plan

The Church Knowle Parish Neighbourhood Plan will apply for another tranche of grant funding and a draft plan is being prepared based on community input. The consultant is being retained.

Dorset Council

The ward councillor Ben Wilson presented his report. Included in this was an update on the approved 30mph speed limit in Church Knowle from Dorset Highways:

This speed reduction meets criteria; however, it is not one of our high-risk collision areas that can receive 100% funding allocation from the modest road safety capital budget. We have therefore offered the opportunity to the parish council to promote this scheme (or at least offer a financial contribution) and we are awaiting their update before considering next step. The parish council is seeking clarification from Dorset Highways on what update they are seeking. It has been pushing hard for a speed limit of any sort in Church Knowle parish and has wholeheartedly supported this 30 mph limit through

His report also gave a detailed description of the traffic management for Camp Bestival.

<u>Planning</u>

The Council resolved to have no objection to the planning application for extensions at Stansfield (P/FUL/2024/02338).

Correspondence

Correspondence has been received from Mr Ben Edwards about meetings he has had with Dorset Highways and measures he has taken to restrict the damaging use of off road vehicles on the Cucknowle ridge right of way. This has been raised at several parish council meetings and the council is to write to Dorset Highways giving full support to these measures.

Concern about the construction of timber log cabins at Cotness lakes was raised by a parishioner. It appears that these may not need planning permission but the progress of any construction will be monitored for compliance.

It was reported that some large trees have been felled by the Old Mission Hall. Since these are not subject to a Tree Preservation Order and are outside the Conservation Area the Dorset tree Officer has confirmed that no permissions are required.

Furzebrook Phone Box

This was decommissioned by BT, adopted by the Parish Council over a year ago and is available for a new role. Suggestions for a use for this box are sought. Pease contact the clerk and these will be put to the Parish Council to be considered.

Tenders

The last Playing Field inspection recommended that the wooden elements be treated with preservative. Tenders are therefore being sought for treating all of the timber at the playing field with an approved preservative. The timber will have to be sanded to remove any splinters first. Apply to the Clerk at clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk for details.

The June meeting finished at 8:30 pm. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Church Knowle Village Hall at $6:30 \text{ on } 9^{\text{h}}$ July 2024.

Updates from the National Trust

Our wildlife stars on Springwatch

Did you see the wealth of Purbeck wildlife on BBC Springwatch? We worked with camera crews to film on several National areas of our land. The most dramatic story had to be the peregrine nest on Corfe Castle, where several chicks met a grisly

demise. At the time of writing, the one remaining chick is doing well and getting fat from all the food that's being brought in.

Also featured were the puffins at Dancing Ledge. Presenter Iolo Williams interviewed volunteer Richard Caldow about the work that's being undertaken to find out why this colony is under threat of extinction – and if there is anything



we can do to help save these iconic birds. Just before filming ended, several of the puffins appeared right on cue!

The Springwatch spotlight also briefly shone on the beavers that have appeared at Little Sea, as well as the nightingale that's been heard singing on Ballard Down (not Berkeley Square!). You can see all the episodes on BBC iPlayer.

Strong and gentle 'bruisers'!

Heavy horses are helping us with 'bracken bruising' across large expanses of the Purbeck countryside.

This sounds drastic but it is a sustainable way of supressing the growth of bracken without the need for chemicals. Without control, bracken spreads rapidly, shading out other plants and reducing biodiversity.

Before work takes place, our rangers

check the area and mark any birds' nests so they aren't disturbed. The slow progress of the horses, and sound of the rollers, encourage other wildlife to scurry or slither away.

The work is being undertaken by specialist local contractor, Toby Hoad, with his two Comtois horses (one of the oldest breeds of draft horses), and James Foster with his black and white Shire horse.

In areas that aren't suitable for the horses, the work is being carried out by Trust staff using mechanical rollers. The aim isn't to control all the bracken, but to keep a balance between it and other plants.

Future Studland - join the conversation

We're working in partnership with Dorset Coast Forum on Future Studland, our plan for the Studland Peninsula over the next 50 years. It will explore how we balance the area being hugely popular with people, as well as being a nationally important wildlife habitat. It will also encompass travel and transport options, accessibility and the infrastructure in the area.

Tracey Churcher, General Manager for the National Trust in Purbeck, said:

"With the coast at Studland changing so rapidly, we need to consider how we can continue to provide great visitor infrastructure and manage nature conservation. It is a complex undertaking.

"Some issues relate entirely to relocating our facilities in the face of their imminent loss through coastal erosion. Others such as transport and access are wider issues which will need agencies across the area working together to bring about change.

"For the consultation, we are working closely with statutory organisations, partners, tenants

and other stakeholders to shape our plans. We would also very much like members of the public to share their views and ideas."

Over the summer, Dorset Coast Forum will be seeking and collating the views of residents, visitors and local businesses. If you want to join the conversation, there's a drop-in session at Studland Village Hall on Wednesday 10 July, 10am – 4pm. There will also be opportunities to input digitally.

Trust Thousands of people across the UK live with disabilities that severely limit mobility and cannot use standard accessible toilets. Users and their families are often forced to change their loved one on a toilet floor when on days out which is both unhygienic, and undignified.

accessible toilets as they provide more space, an adult-sized changing bench, hoist, a peninsular toilet, a height adjustable basin and are heated to a comfortable 22 degrees all year round.

The room at Castle View has level access from the disabled parking, café and second-hand bookshop.

Funding for the Changing Place came from Dorset Council who secured funding from the Department of Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) to provide seven more changing places toilets across the Dorset Council area.





Historic Eight Steam Locomotive 'Strictly Bulleid Ii' Gala

Attracts More Than 4,700 People

An historic gala gathering featuring eight impressive 1940s Bulleid Pacific steam locomotives has attracted more than 4,700 passengers in what was the Swanage Railway's largest special event that captured the imagination of enthusiasts.

'Strictly Bulleid II' took place between Friday, 7 June, and Sunday, 9 June, 2024, inclusive, with a preview taster day on Thursday, 6 June, 2024, marking the 80th anniversary of the crucial DDay Allied invasion of Nazi-occupied Europe in 1944.

The evocative celebration of the 56th anniversary of the end of steam trains in southern England in July, 1967, saw the largest gathering of working Bulleid Pacific locomotives since that date when an era – and a way of life for generations of railwaymen – came to an end.

'Strictly Bulleid II' also saw the largest gathering of Merchant Navy class Bulleid Pacifics, hauling trains since the end of southern England steam in 1967 as well as the largest gathering of Bulleid Pacifics in their original 1940s form with an air-smoothed metal casing over the boiler

– the locomotives being known as 'Spam Cans' because of their distinctive shape.



Designed by Southern Railway chief mechanical engineer Oliver Vaughan Snell Bulleid during the Second World War, the Bulleid Pacifics hauled trains from London to Corfe Castle and Swanage between the late 1940s and 1966.

Delighted 'Strictly Bulleid II' steam gala event organiser Alexander Atkins said: "The highlight of

'Strictly Bulleid II' was experiencing the wonderful atmosphere of the eight locomotive event and seeing the complex train timetable, on nine miles of railway, run as well as it did.

"It has been a remarkable journey getting everything organised and feeling the buzz and excitement generated by 'Strictly Bulleid II' among our customers, staff and volunteers – who have worked so hard to deliver this event - is the greatest reward.

"Strictly Bulleid II' was a wonderful celebration of some of the most popular classes of steam locomotives and to admire eight Bulleid Pacifics in steam together was totally breathtaking and an astounding achievement by our dedicated staff and volunteers.

"I cannot praise the 'Strictly Bulleid II' organising committee team enough for pulling together an amazing and historic event. My thanks also go to the locomotive owning groups because

without their generosity, enthusiasm and support we would not have been able to pull the historic and impressive line-up together," added Alexander who is a driver on the Swanage Railway after starting in the heritage line's youth group.

Swanage Railway Company chairman Gavin Johns said: ""We were delighted with the level of interest in our historic 'Strictly Bulleid II' steam gala which carried more than 4,700 passengers during the four-day event that captured the imagination of enthusiasts. "Events like this take a lot of planning, securing co-operation from locomotive owners and transport hauliers as well as the daunting task of delivering a complex operation. To everyone who took part in whatever role - thank you. 'Strictly Bullied II' was a distinct, unique and a real pleasure to experience," added Gavin who is a volunteer signalman on the heritage line.



Most of the 'Strictly Bulleid II' trains hauled trains along the whole length f the nine-mile Swanage Railway between Swanage, Harman's Cross, Corfe Castle, Norden and beyond to Furzebrook and the River Frome – just before the heritage line's connection with the

national railway network and within sight of Wareham.

The 'Strictly Bulleid II' preview day featured two Bulleid Pacifics hauling trains between Swanage and Norden with the unique and newly restored Victorian London and South Western Railway T3 class locomotive No. 563 also hauling trains to Norden on that day – replicating the T3's vital role in hauling trains in the build up to D-Day in June, 1944.

In a first for the Swanage Railway, there were evocative night-time passengers trains on the Sunday morning that departed Swanage at 1am, 3am, 5am and 7am in an atmospheric recreation of the night steam trains from the days of British Railways. There were also beer trains operating on the Friday and Saturday evenings.

The Sunday of the gala was 'Named Train Sunday' with the Bulleid Pacifics carrying prestigious express train headboards such as Bournemouth Belle and Golden Arrow.

Eyes to the Skies


Red kite, sparrow hawk & kestrel are being seen regularly around the ridges and fields especially when the grass is being cut for silage, sadly no sign of the sea eagles in the last couple of weeks.

The strong north westerly winds saw the arrival of 500+ swifts with the odd sand and house martin tagging along on two separate occasions in the first ten days of June, swarming like flying ants while the local peregrine's chased after them, a spectacular sight.

Down in the Bay a Grey seal has been spotted on a few occasions and an adder basking in the sun by the boat slipway, I've also seen the first fledgling white throats around the brambles by the sea wall.

Finally to the most unexpected bird of the month for Kimmeridge, seven Canada geese flying in formation over the village early one morning.

Nostalgic 'Roads To Rail' Steam Rally To

Take Place Next To Norden Station

Dedicated Swanage Railway volunteers are to

stage a nostalgic fund-raising steam rally in a field next to Norden station near the village of Corfe Castle – bringing the Isle of Purbeck to life with evocative re-creations of a bygone age.

Featuring up to 50 traction and miniature engines, steam rollers and showman's engines – as well as fairground rides, trade stalls, food stalls, bar and live music – the evocative and family friendly three-day yesteryear 'Roads to Rail' gathering takes place between Friday, 28 June, and Sunday, 30 June, 2024, inclusive.

A special intensive steam train service between Norden, Corfe Castle and Swanage will be operating during the event – including a special evening heritage diesel service on the Friday and Saturday evenings.

Camping pitches, which must be pre-booked via a special 'Roads to Rail' website at <u>swanagerailwayroadstorail.co.uk</u>, will also be available during the event in a field close to Norden station while there will be live music on the Friday and Saturday evenings.

Now in its fourth year, the popular 'Roads to Rail' event was first staged in August, 2021.

The Rambling Gardener

July is good for walking in the mornings and the evenings, as well as relaxing with a paintbox or book in lovely sunshine or shade. Remember that it is often lovely until the start of the children's summer holidays when East winds and fog seems disrupt our plans! This weather always seemed to last until they went back to school and the better weather returns for the end of September, ironic!

In the late forties and early fifties there was still rationing so July was a great month with fresh peas, beans, carrots and lots more. We had a big garden and grew things for sale. Each morning father would ring the shops to see what they would take and what they would pay us, then we would get the vegetables ready, deliver them and collect the money. On the farm we grew maize that, in July, would be six feet high! Good fun to play in, but it was hard work cutting and barrowing it to feed the cows. Every evening, we would bicycle to Peveril Point for a swim and high tea. I don't remember it ever being too wet, but it must have been on some days so maybe we just didn't notice.

Garden jobs for July. In the flower beds, keep flowers blooming for longer by deadheading regularly. If plants are blown over then cut them to the ground, they may reflower or produce a neat dome of green foliage until the first frosts. Make sure that there are some seats to just sit in and enjoy your garden and listen to the wildlife. Accept a few holes in leaves, but if it bothers you don't grow that plant next year. I have ducks as slug patrols, so they clear most of my slugs and snails. If slugs and snails are a problem, (it might be specific plants,) so try other plants. Buy bedding plants to fill any bare spaces annuals grow fast to give cover until the frosts start but will need to be replanted next year. It is easier to grow perennials to fill spaces. Check the plant will suit the soil, situation (shade, sun or windy), and mature size is suitable to your garden. Perennials are so much better for low maintenance.

In the vegetable garden there are lots of jobs. Keep peas and beans picked to keep them fruiting, and pick, blanche and freeze excess vegetables as much as possible. Early in July there are many seeds you can plant to get a late summer crop, such as; peas, beans, broad beans, carrots, swede and turnips for winter cropping. Spring cabbage can be planted directly into the beds or in pots for later transplanting. Do transplant when you have room and always aim to interplant. Lettuce, radish, carrot or other quick growing vegetables could be interplanted between late harvesting crops such as spring cabbages. Garlic and onions, that do not like competition, should be kept free of weeds by using a slide hoe, but weed by hand any weed growing too close to the bulbs, to avoid bulb damage. Onion sets should be planted at 4" x 12", there are many varieties ripening at different times. Shallots can store for a year hanging in a cool room.

The magazine from our water supplier, Wessex Water, suggested how to save money and water which is very important. 1. Reduce shower time – a family of four could save £150 a year. 2. Reduce the number of washing machine loads. 3. Check that your toilets and taps do not drip. 4. Use a watering-can to water your plants and a moisture meter to avoid over-watering. 5. Put in large enough water butts to make the most effective use of free water from the roofs, the standard little round water butts are not very useful! Tall rectangular are far easier to site near sheds and houses.

Kingswood Farm

For a change, we go out of parish, to a farm lying in the parish of Studland. However, it paid dues to the lord of the manor of Corfe Castle as the wood was literally the King's wood. The mayor, the bailiff, the rest of the township of Corfe Castle and the parson of Studland were permitted to take away one load of frith (brushwood) yearly from Kingswood. Two customary tenants (those noted on the court roll) could take two loads each as could the tenant at Claywell.




1805 map of the Rempstone Estate. Their farmlands lay within the darker boundary line.

The farmhouse is Grade II listed and built in the early 18th century according to the Royal Commission, but a dwelling had stood hereabouts in the late 14th century. King Richard II granted to John Wolde for his life "*a messuage with land, meadow and wood with appurtenances in Estpubick called* 'Kyngeswode', co. Dorset, late of Richard Unewyn, together with the keepership of the King's coneys (rabbits) within his forest of Purbik" (Calendar of Patent Rolls).

Originally belonging to the Uvedale family, the farm was inherited by William Okeden when his father-in-law, George Uvedale, died in 1630. John Calcraft

purchased the farm in 1759 which included the small tenement of 6 acres in the Northeastern corner which had been let separately.

The farmlands are now divided by the B3351 but the original road to Studland curved up on to Kingswood Down (roughly indicated where the dotted lines are on the map below).
