

Highways Consultation Results: In May, the Parish Council sought the opinions of residents regarding parking and parking restrictions on West Street. 66% of responses were from residents who live on West Street or adjoining roads. Here are the recorded results:

- Single Yellow Lines (SYL) to Double Yellow Lines (DYL) from the car park entrance road to the car park exit road. (West side of West Street) - 61% in favour of change
- 2. Single Yellow Lines (SYL) to Double Yellow Lines (DYL) from the car park entrance road to unmade road West Street.

 (just after 55 West Street). 74% in favour of change.





3. To reduce parking on the corner of West Street opposite the Green Goat. -71% in favour of change.

Whilst this consultation focused on the specific areas mentioned above, please be assured those other areas, such as outside the museum, are also under review. The next step for the Parish Council is to submit the results to Dorset Council. The Parish Council would like to thank everyone for their feedback and assure you each comment was read and considered.

Aster Housing: It has recently come to the attention of the Parish Council that Aster Housing is considering the sale of one of its properties in Corfe Castle. The Parish Council is concerned about this sale and has reached out to Aster Housing to request a meeting. This meeting will include other local housing providers with the aim to discuss strategies for retaining affordable housing in Corfe Castle. We will keep the community informed as more information becomes available

Litter in the Square: Last month, a member of the public raised concerns about the significant amount of litter around the square and requested action from the Parish Council. After investigating the issue, the Parish Council found that the excessive litter primarily occurred over one weekend (the May Bank Holiday), during which the bins overflowed.

The Parish Council consulted with both the Parish Caretaker and Dorset Waste Partnership to understand the situation better. They explored the possibility of installing a larger commercial-sized bin but concluded that the expense could not be justified given the circumstances.

Going forward, the Parish Council is collaborating with Dorset Waste Partnership to prevent a recurrence of the litter overflow experienced during the bank holiday weekend

Memorial Garden: During the July meeting, the Parish Council reviewed a proposal for the development of a new Memorial Garden in God's Acre. The submitted quotes, which exceeded £2,000, outlined the costs to level and grass seed the area.

After thoughtful discussion, the Council decided that the expenditure was not justifiable at this time. Instead, a more gradual approach will be taken, utilising available spoil to level the area over time. This method ensures that the project can progress in a cost-effective manner without imposing a significant financial burden.

We appreciate the community's patience and support as we work towards creating a serene and beautiful space for remembrance.

Planning application update: The following applications have been received by Corfe Castle Parish Council, for full details including proposed works please see the Dorset Council website:

Application No: P/HOU/2024/03340, Location: Merryfields West Street, BH20 5HE, Proposal: Demolition of existing garage, changes to windows and modifications to existing roof to provide additional bedroom. Comment Corfe Castle Parish Council understand and appreciate the owners' wish to update their property and support the suggested new slate roof and new windows and doors. Although Merryfields itself is not considered to be a heritage asset, it is built of Purbeck stone and is within the Conservation Area, and we cannot support the proposed larch cladding. We believe that this would impact on the character of the area as a whole and particularly the Conservation area. We find the visual appearance and finishing materials of the larch cladding to be unacceptable and therefore the Parish Council object to this application.

Application No: P/LBC/2024/03524, Location: Wissett Cottage 53 East Street BH20 5EE E, Proposal: The pointing on (south facing) end gable wall of the building has become pitted and crumbly possibly aiding ingress of moisture through the wall. This proposal therefore is to rake out existing pointing and repoint with 3.5 naturally hydraulic lime mixed with local sand. Comment Corfe Castle Parish Council have no issue with the raking out of old mortar and repointing of the south facing gable end wall with suitable lime-based mortar, and therefore the Parish Council have no objection to this application

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Church Knowle Parish Council

The July meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Church Knowle Village Hall on Tuesday 9th July 2024 at 6:30pm. It was attended by seven members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair) and four members of the public.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Vacancies on the Parish Council

There is still one vacancy on the council which has a full strength of nine and any interested parishioners can apply to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk.

Presentation on Community Housing

Mrs Cuff of Dorset Community Action gave a presentation on rural housing and housing trusts.

The Road over Rail Bridge at Furzebrook

It has been drawn to the attention of the Parish Council and the Dorset Council that the crash barriers (there are none) at road over rail bridge at Furzebrook do not meet the current National Highways CS461 guidance. The Parish Council is requesting the Dorset Council to re-examine the safety features of this bridge. The concern is that there are insufficient barriers to prevent a vehicle from tumbling down the embankment onto the tracks in the event of an accident.

The Playing Field

It was reported that bad behaviour and drinking is still occurring in the playing field. The Parish Council will put together a working party day to implement the measures in the safety inspections, sanding and treating the woodwork and put up signs warning against anti-social behaviour. The Playing Field is regularly mowed and maintained in good condition by the Parish Council.

Neighbourhood Plan

The Church Knowle Parish Neighbourhood Plan is continuing.

Speed Limits in Church Knowle Parish

The 30mph speed limit in Church Knowle has been approved by the Dorset Council. The parish council resolved that it was unable to make the substantial financial contribution to implementing this requested by Dorset Highways as it was not anticipated in the parish council's budget. There are presently no speed limits other than the National Speed Limit of 60 mph in the parish and this speed limit through the village, which has been approved, will be implemented.

There will be a preliminary survey for a speed limit on Grange Road in response to requests from parishioners. This is a long straight country road where excess speed is hazardous and not uncommon. A speed limit is entirely appropriate.

The July meeting finished at 8:07 pm. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Furzebrook Village Hall at 6:30 on 13th August 2024.

The society are masters of bringing this period of history to life and visitors will be able to see, hear and feel the drama of the

battle to take the castle. There are various events during the Saturday and Sunday from living history demonstrations - cooking, dining and working artisans to give a flavour of what life was like and Lady Bankes is also making an appearance with her officers.

Discover the social divide between the finely dressed officers and gentry and the soldiers and tradesmen beneath them and get ready for some live firing! Please do come along and watch it all unfold and also take note of the live firing times as we do appreciate these can be very loud for the village.

Firing times on both Saturday 7th and Sunday 8th September:

Cannon fire @ 12pm

Musket fire @ 1pm

Musket fire @2:30pm

Light firing may be done @3:30pm during the betrayal section of the reenactment.

Event Schedule:

Saturday 7th and Sunday 8th September. 10:30am-4:30pm

10.30am: the soldiers and household will form up at in the West Street car park and march to the Square for 11am, where they will meet Lady Bankes and a proclamation will be read by Colonel Henry Anktell (the governor of the Castle). They will then all march in to the Castle.

11am-4.30pm: Living history (cooks, artisans, soldiers demonstrations, gentry dining) to give a flavour of what life was like.

12pm: Cannon fire

1pm: Watch Lady Bankes and her officers have dinner in the field.

1pm: Musket fire

12:00 - 12:30pm: The ECWS will perform a pike and musket drill. This will be followed by a children's drill.

12:30pm: Firing of 1 small cannon in remembrance

2:30pm: Musket fire

3:00 - 3:30pm: Traitor Colonel Pitman betrays the Castle before it is stormed

Nature updates from the National Trust

Did you know that Corfe Common is one of the few places in the UK where you can see the endangered southern damselfly? Volunteers recorded 36 of these vivid blue damselflies this

year, the highest number since our surveys began in 2018. On nearby Hartland Moor, numbers

have stayed stable at 198.

This success ties in with the work we've been doing to rewet areas of the common and clear waterside vegetation. Southern damselflies need shallow, unpolluted water with open, sunny banks.

We have six types of blue damselfly in the UK, each distinguished by the patterns on their abdomen. As the name suggests, the common blue damselfly is the most frequently seen.

Damselflies are more slender and delicate than dragonflies and usually rest with their wings folded back. Dragonflies are bigger with more powerful flight, and rest with their wings outstretched (like an aeroplane).

We're very happy to report that the one surviving peregrine chick at the castle has now flown the nest. It looks strong and healthy, and will stay nearby for some weeks, still begging for food from its parents.

Peregrines are among the fastest animals on the planet, reaching speeds of up to 200 miles per hour when 'stooping' - diving down on their prey from high above. Their prey consists mostly of birds like feral pigeons and collared doves.

Peregrines nest in high places such as cliffs, cathedrals – and castles! Their numbers reached a low point in the 1960s due to human persecution and the impact of pesticides. Numbers are now increasing thanks to legislation – they are a protected species under the Wildlife and Countryside Act and disturbing them is a criminal offence.

Don't forget that if you live in the Parish of Corfe Castle you can get free entry into the castle – an ideal chance to do some peregrine watching!

Cattle grazing

Cattle are now grazing on Corfe Common, helping us maintain the area as an amazing place for wildlife. Cattle pull up coarse vegetation, giving space for a wider variety of plants to grow. They also create areas of bare soil which are important basking sites for insects and reptiles. Cattle dung provides food for beetles and flies, which in turn feed many birds and bats.

Please remember:

- Don't feed or approach the cattle and give them plenty of space.
- Keep dogs on short leads where cattle are grazing.
- If cattle approach you, stay calm, and let your dog off the lead so you can both move to safety.

Patient Participation Group

As I write Wimbledon is over and we are awaiting the result of THE Football match after which we hope the weather will improve to give us some sunshine for the school holidays and before we need to think about the Autumn when the Surgery will be offering flu vaccines and the **new RSV vaccine**. Hopefully they can be offered at the same time in October but pregnant ladies and children will be offered earlier vaccination in September when the PPG team will support the surgery team if needed. RSV is the Respiratory syncytial virus and is the common cause of coughs and colds. It is not usually serious but babies, children and older adults with a

weakened immune system have a higher risk of getting seriously ill so it is recommended that these groups receive immunisation. More information will follow shortly so please look out for posters in the surgery, on the surgery website and or on the PPG facebook page.

The PPG is always keen to receive issues that Surgery patients would like us to raise with the Practice team. As expected concerns are few but the collection of medicines from the outside dispensary window has been mentioned on several occasions, patients' asking if collections could be made inside the building particularly when it is raining. I have raised this with the Surgery who regrettably say that as the dispensary is busier than ever and space is limited within the surgery, the outside collection point will continue to support confidentiality and best use of available space.

Action For Health and Care In Purbeck

One of the concerns that the ACTION for HEALTH and CARE in PURBECK Group has, following various comments made by members of the public, is that they are being offered health appointments at one of our 3 major hospitals ie Poole, Bournemouth and Dorchester when sometimes those clinics also run in either Swanage or Wareham Community Hospitals, much nearer to their homes.

So we urge anyone being offered a health appointment at any of these to question the booking clerk whether this could be done more locally. The booking agents usually offer the first available appointment rather than looking at the geography. So if your condition is not urgent ask whether you could be seen in either Wareham or Swanage, making travel much shorter and easier.

Of course if you need help quickly your first port of call is still the 111 phone line and for emergencies 999. It is important you do this, even if your condition might be treatable at the MIU in Swanage, so that you can be advised about the best and safest course of action.

A2B-C, or Getting from A to B with less C (Carbon).

One of the benefits of the tourist season here is that more 'buses come out of hibernation. We currently have 3 or 4 different numbered 'buses between Corfe Castle, Wareham and Swanage. We can even get a 'bus to far-flung places like Wool and Lulworth! The timings may be a bit strange, with all the 'buses arriving within 10 minutes or so of each other, perhaps because different companies are involved. But all these 'buses, free with a 'bus pass or costing £2 at the most for a trip, are a good incentive to leave the car at home, and avoid paying for parking too. If you haven't considered using the local 'bus service, do give it a try. The drivers are helpful, and can lower the front if the step's a bit high for you, or fit a ramp if you are on wheels. Once on board you can relax and gaze at our wonderful Purbeck views out of the window.

Of course, the most eco-friendly way of getting from A to B is by walking, but it takes longer, and may not be appropriate. For many people, cycling is an option. Apart from buying the bike (and all the lycra gear and safety stuff) it is very inexpensive and a lot quicker than walking. Electric bikes have made cycling far more possible for more people, meaning you can get up hills with much less effort! If you have solar panels on your roof, charging your electric bike could be virtually free too! The fresh air and exercise of walking and cycling have great physical and mental health benefits too.

And then there's the train to Swanage. For a one-off journey the cost is high, but you can travel much more cheaply if you use it frequently.

So there are some suggestions for making August a 'Use The Car Less' month, helping to save some money and reducing carbon emissions too.




superb photo canvas images of the Castle

Rachel Fooks from Rachel Fooks Ceramics based in Furzebrook gave us a very interesting and interactive pottery demonstration. We learnt about different types of clay and had the opportunity to see and feel example specimens which, Rachel gathers locally from around Ridge. Rachel then talked us through the many ways that clay can be made into finished articles and which clay is suitable for which method. Besides 'throwing pots' on a potter's wheel, we were shown how clay can be rolled, cut and moulded by hand. Then it was on to glazes and firing. Rachel often collects things from nature, such as seaweed and crystal, and uses these to make her own glazes. We learned that the final colour is only seen when the piece comes out of firing, so it is always a magical moment to see what the finished article looks



like as it comes out of the kiln.

There were beautiful examples of each method for us to admire.

Finally, we had the opportunity to make our own piece of pottery which Rachel will glaze and fire for us.

We can't wait until September to see how they all turned out.



The Rev Anne Bond writes

In my last letter I wrote about the good news of our two-for-one package that is to be our new Rector and his Reverend Wife; and then I commented on atheism and asked: taking into account the remarkable achievements originating in and put into practice by the ingenuity of the human brain, might it not be foolish to discount absolutely the possibility that this same brain may be capable of perceiving a being who is, in fact, the source of all existence?

A few years ago I found myself at a dinner party sitting between two gentlemen who addressed not one word to me, but instead amused each other by waxing lyrical about the uselessness of the Church, the ineffectiveness of its ministers, and the responsibility of local Vicars for the Church's decline in popularity. And then they began on the iniquitous introduction into Holy

Orders of women. They talked across me, almost nestling their elbows in my plate.

I wasn't wearing a dog collar, and in any case, I couldn't get a word in edgeways. At the end of dinner, I rose from my chair and was unable not to hear the comment: "She didn't have much to say, did she?" and the reply: "At least she wasn't a She-Vicar. They're like witches – duck 'em and drown 'em I say!"

I wish I had been clever enough to say something biting and sophisticated that cut the ground from under their feet! But as often happens in the heat of the moment, I felt stunned into total brainlessness. I had defended neither the Church, nor the Clergy, nor even Jesus himself. I felt foolish, and feeble, and faithless.

Faithless? No. Certainly foolish and feeble – but not faithless. The amazing thing about Jesus is that he uses a person's faith *however small, weak and shaky it may be*, to carry out miracles of reassurance, healing, restoration and recovery; but he said himself that if a person has no faith at all, then there's nothing he can do. (Mark 6:5-6.)

I'm no great brain, but I do have faith. I believe in God who is the Father immortal and invisible; the Son who as one of us walked this earth, bore mankind's wrongdoing in his own self and died a punishing human death on our behalf; and the Holy Spirit who is the essence of the Son living, active and working in this world. I wouldn't be wearing a dog collar if I didn't believe, would I?

But my two extremely rude dinner companions did have a point. If it is at all important for people to believe in God, it is equally important the clergy – and indeed all believers - should be able to explain to those with no faith what Christianity is all about, the purpose being that all people become equipped to fight evil and its works, and blessed by the peace of mind that follows.

Let us hope and pray that our new Rector(s) will be similarly enthused.



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Swanage Skatepark Community Project raises £20,000 towards new skatepark equipment with Crowdfunder campaign!

The Swanage Skatepark Community Project (SSCP) is thrilled to announce that they have successfully reached their Crowdfunder goal, securing £20,000

for the rebuilding of Swanage Skatepark. Generous community donations totaling £14,000 enabled the project to receive an additional £6,000 in match funding from Sport England, providing a robust start to their fundraising efforts.

Heidi Florence from SSCP says: 'We're so grateful to the community for supporting our fundraising efforts over



the past few months. Thanks to this collective effort, we not only reached our Crowdfunder target but have succeeded in giving Swanage Skatepark a sense of identity, and skatepark users feel like they belong to something. Running the Crowdfunder campaign and hosting our first Community Day have laid the foundations for building the vibrant skate community we want to see in Swanage.'

The fundraising campaign was initially planned to run for 8 weeks, but was extended to 12 weeks to allow extra time to reach the target. Success finally came at a recent Swanage Town & Community Partnership AGM when representatives from the Town Council and various local groups came together and voted unanimously to give a generous donation of £4,000 to the Swanage Skatepark Crowdfunder.

The work of Swanage Town & Community Partnership focuses on creating a vibrant, friendly community for everyone, supported by a thriving economy in a safe and healthy environment. Recent meetings have been focused on development of a youth strategy, and it was clear that the Swanage Skatepark Community Project is a key piece of that puzzle.

The Crowdfunder campaign was a community effort with local businesses offering rewards as an incentive for donations. In addition Swanage Badminton Club, Tilly's Ice Cream and Skate Not Bored all contributed generously to the donations.

Heidi Florence from SSCP says: 'Reaching our Crowdfunder target was crucial not only to secure match funding from Sport England but also to show grant-giving organisations that our community strongly supports the project.

Potential funders will want to see that the skatepark is desired and backed by the community, and our Crowdfunder campaign clearly demonstrates this.'

The £20k from the Crowdfunder joins a pledge of £15k from Swanage Town Council bringing the total raised so far to £35k. With the target of not just replacing the removed ramps but improving and expanding the skatepark, SSCP are aiming to raise £200,000 to fully fund the project.

Next steps for the Swanage Skatepark Community Project are to use this springboard of community donations to apply to local and national grants. SSCP is already working on applications for three opportunities with deadlines in July and August. And, business sponsorship packages are currently in development.

The group also plans to host a follow-up to the June 1st 'Skatepark Community Day,' which saw hundreds of people enjoying the vibrancy of skatepark culture. This event is likely to take place in the autumn 2024. The group is seeking additional volunteers to help make this happen.

The SSCP team would like to thank everyone who has made a donation already and all the businesses who offered rewards. Special thanks to #Willdoes for funding the Skatepark Community Day.

Whilst our target to achieve match funding has been hit, the Crowdfunder will remain open for additional donations as every penny counts!

How Corfe Lost It's Mayor.

Ida Woodward writing in 1907 declared Corfe to be one of the most ancient Boroughs in England, and there can be no doubt about this. A Saxon burgh and Norman stronghold it undoubtedly had a Mayor or its equivalent for more than 1000 years. The word Mayor is Norman French and denotes the Town Leader. There are records of Mayors in Corfe as far back as the time of Richard 11 and by the Charter of Queen Elizabeth the Councillors could call themselves 'Barons' with the privilege of being able to hunt the stag on Mayday. They had the right to choose mayor, bailiffs and the coroner. The Court Rolls enacted that no islander could marry his daughter to an outsider without the Constable's permission that no house could be built on the heath and no fishing allowed on the Sabbath.

However the Mayoralty was doomed by a report in 1879 by the Municipal Corporation Commission which singled out some 86 small Corporations. It read - "It appears to us that it is not expedient that any of these Corporations which are municipal should continue in their present state and condition. It seems to us that by the smallness of their population and the duties performed that they should not retain their municipal functions". There were other towns which suffered and one of these was Christchurch which unlike Corfe has regained it's Mayor and status. The national press derived some amusement from the report and the Daily News wrote in 1880 "Corfe is one of the most curious villages in southern England. It lies under the picturesque ruin which guards the opening through the great chalk downs which shut off the Isle of Purbeck. It has a Corporation as quaint as the odd houses which have a single room protruding into the main street over the front door. Some time ago there was a caricature circulated of the local grocer who was also the Mayor, who selected the Mayor, the Chairman of the Public Trusts and of the Committee appointed annually to look into the accounts of the Trusts and of those who dispose of the trusts. They were all the same person. There is also a mace bearer who attends the Mayor, a cantor whose duty it is to inspect all food in the Borough and the most coveted post of ale bearer. There is also a hayward whose duty it is to prevent cattle from damaging hedges and to put them in the local pound".

The result of the Commission's report and unfavourable press comment was that Corfe lost its Mayor and Corporation status, being reduced to a Paris council some few years afterwards. Ninety years later the same fate befell Swanage and Wareham although the former was never a Borough.

The clock was turned back when tradition became more important. By the 1972 Local Government Act, Parish Councils who wished to do so could pass a resolution by changing the name (but nothing else) to that of Town Council with

a Town Mayor. Swanage and Wareham chose to do this. Tradition dies hard in Dorset, perhaps it is not too much to hope that one day we may see the Mayor, followed by his mace bearer, parading the streets of our village once more.

Eyes to the Skies July

Well finally the weather has changed and the sun has been shining on us, house martins and swallows are swooping over the fields catching insects on the wing and the chirping of fledgling birds is filling the air along every hedgerow. There are plenty of raptors about, this year's courting displays by the buzzards around Kimmeridge have been amazing with lots of stooping and tumbling.

Red kite, sparrow hawk & kestrel are being seen regularly around the ridges and fields especially when the grass is being cut for silage, sadly no sign of the sea eagles in the last couple of weeks.

The strong north westerly winds saw the arrival of 500+ swifts with the odd sand and house martin tagging along on two separate occasions in the first ten days of June, swarming like flying ants while the local peregrine's chased after them, a spectacular sight.

Down in the Bay a Grey seal has been spotted on a few occasions and an adder basking in the sun by the boat slipway, I've also seen the first fledgling white throats around the brambles by the sea wall.

Finally to the most unexpected bird of the month for Kimmeridge, seven Canada geese flying in formation over the village early one morning. Happy birding, Cheers, Rose & Pat

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

The Rambling Gardener

August here already! The nights are drawing in; if wet and windy it will be nice to be inside, but on hot days the sea will be lovely. Let's hope we have some nice days. In the 1940's, after the cows had been milked in the afternoon all seven of us used to bicycle to Peveril Point to swim and to have high tea. There was petrol rationing so we used the bicycles as much as we could. When I was young I loved swimming in the cold and rain as then the water seemed warmer, but now I am glad if I don't have to.

My mother taught me my schoolwork and the other skills she thought I needed, but she also made everything fun. So I enjoy spinning, making my own clothes, darning, painting, gardening, bird watching, being observant and making herbal remedies. She said that salt, water, garlic and honey are the best basic treatments for many injuries. In 1957 a doctor supported that by teaching me to mix honey with flower until it was like putty to put on an abscess on my husband's neck that hadn't responded to any other treatments. The next day all the poison had been pulled out and it was healing. I have used this on many small abscesses, and puncture wounds and grazes on children, adults and animals since.

With the changing weather it's hard to plan, but plants that have grown fast in the warmer, but wet, July need cutting back. I will be doing a lot of trimming, and seeing that all support wires are in good repair for climbers and soft fruit; it is so much easier to strengthen things before they fall over. The summer fruiting raspberries and loganberries need to be cut to the ground when they have finished fruiting and the new growth tied in with hemp string (not nylon if possible).

Plums and apricots have to be pruned in the summer to prevent die back. Small Apples should be thinned to get nice healthy fruit - if one leaves too much fruit on a tree it may not have fruit every year. Look for canker, which grows in wet crowded conditions, and if seen cut it right back so it does not pass on the disease to other branches - the wet summer will be making it bad this year. When the fruit come off the tree easily, pick and store them somewhere cool, I lay them out in a single layer in boxes in the garage. Every variety of apple ripens at a different time, my latest apple to ripen is Anne Elizabeth and that was still good from store until April this year.

Shallow rooted plants may need water from your water butts if dry but check with a moisture meter before spending time watering as plants can wilt because they have too much water or they have grown too big and should be cut back. Keep on dead-heading all flowers and vegetables so they keep on producing flowers and food. If potato leaves turn yellow and blotchy cut them back to the

ground and dig as soon as you can as it means they have blight which kills both tomatoes and potatoes in wet weather - a real bother to all vegetable growers. Vegetables to sow in August include: lettuce, quick and slow maturing, quick maturing spinach, swiss chard for next year, quick growing peas in the hope of some more, winter radish, spring cabbage. In any spare ground sow some green manure, mustard is quick or phacelia which is good as it puts nitrogen into the soil and may go through the winter and flower next year with a lovely blue flower that bees love.

I know there is much more one could do but do what you want and enjoy the summer. If you want my advice or want a meal cooked from garden products please ring 01929421681



Scoles Farm

The farmstead stood on the Abbess of Shaftesbury's lands as part of her manor of Kingston lying between Iron Age field systems on the west and a Saxon (maybe older) way on the east. In 1214, she sold some land in the parish of Corfe. It is possible that this is the land that was sold to William de Scawell whom the Abbess employed as one of her roving stewards. Certainly, by the mid 13th century the Scovilles were living here and gave their name to the farm.

Eventually, the male line of the Scovilles died out, and it passed to Beatrix, the sole heiress, who married Peter Clavell. It remained with the Clavell family until another only daughter, Elizabeth Clavell, married Thomas Dackham in about 1510. Thomas Dackham died in 1540, and an inquisition held at his death mentions a house with 132 acres of land and pasture at 'Scovelles' considerably larger than it was in the 18th century.


On the death in 1638 of Edward Dackombe, a descendant of Thomas, Scoles was left to his eldest son, Robert. Robert died childless leaving his estate in 1663 to his sister, Mary Morton. This resulted in a chancery case amongst descendants of the family as it was supposed to pass to his half-brother, Brune Dackombe. The Mortons managed to retain the property though and it passed to the Rev. John Morton Colson of Studland. The vicar sold the property along with a small quarry called 'Quarr Close' to William Morton Pitt of Encombe in 1792. Pitt already owned the land to the west.

According to Edward Dackombe's will of 1635, he had purchased a small quarry from John Bondfield. It is not clear where this lay and the Revd. R. G. Bartelot speculated that this quarry provided the stone to build the current farmhouse for the wedding of Edward's son, Robert in 1631.

There were old medieval quarries lying south of Scoles (two fields called East and West Quarry Closes in 1778) of over 25 acres. A Purbeck marble seam lies east to west over these fields. It is difficult to find a date when these quarries were first dug as more recent excavation may have disturbed any evidence of older workings. Dorset Heritage Gateway calls them 'post medieval extractive pits and quarries' and dated them incorrectly to the 1800s (Upjohn's map shows that they are earlier). On the far east of this marble seam lies Wilkswood and it passes through Dunshay, Woodyhyde and onto Afflington. The Afflington tenants were permitted to open any stone quarries in 1620. So how old are the quarries south of Scoles? Data is sparse which is a shame as it would help date a very distinctive, old, linear boundary wall that runs north to south which was created prior to the quarry workings.

It supposedly had a chapel (Afflington had one which is well documented; Scoles' chapel is not mentioned). The farm was sold to the Earl of Eldon in April 1807 and remained with the Scott family until the mid-20th century when parts of the farm were sold off.






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Pioneer view

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
