

The Situation: our planet - the only one we've got! - is under threat from climate change and biodiversity loss. 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Church Knowle Parish Council

The August meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Furzebrook Village Hall on Tuesday 13th August 2024 at 6:30pm. It was attended by all eight members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair) and thirteen members of the public.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Vacancies on the Parish Council

There is still one vacancy on the council which has a full strength of nine and any interested parishioners can apply to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk.

Public Discussion Period

Mr Jones of the Blue Pool presented his planning applications for the rope bridge, camping and holiday tree houses. Members of the public presented their objections to these plans, mainly on environmental grounds as the developments are either in or on the margins of Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and the standards applied to these sites is very rigorous.

Planning

The Parish Council resolved to object to the three Blue Pool planning applications on the grounds that much more rigorous environmental consultation and formal permissions are required before any development can be considered in these sensitive areas.

Wessex Water and the Corfe River.

Wessex Water have a fund of some £450m to improve environmental water quality and to reduce the overspill of sewage into watercourses. This is a problem for the Corfe River as Wessex Water has dumped sewage into the river on numerous occasions resulting in its having a very poor environment profile. Other councils along the river are to be contacted and Wessex Water will be urged to make practical infrastructure improvements to prevent the dumping of sewage into the river and to improve its quality.

The Playing Field

The Parish Council will examine the feasibility of moving the swing and seesaw from their existing position to the other side of the Playing Field in order to mitigate the nuisance caused by adult anti-social behaviour in the playing field.

The Ward Councillor's Report.

The Ward Councillor Ben Wilson attended the meeting and gave an update on Dorset Council matters affecting the parish including more parish input into planning and the Big Conversation community consultation. Details and venues can be found on the Dorset Council website or on the Parish Council website under Information - Notices.

Sandbanks - Shell Bay Ferry Consultation.

The Studland Parish Council has sent notification of a proposed substantial fare increase for the Sandbanks-Shell Bay Ferry. Details can be found on the Church Knowle website under Information ->Notices, also on the ferry company website and the Studland Parish Council website. Objections may be sent to the department of transport by email.

Road Closure in October.

The road to Church Knowle will be closed for a period on 30th October to facilitate changing a telegraph pole. See Parish Council website under Information -> Notices.

Final Discussion.

There was a discussion about deer shooting parties at the Blue Pool. Concern was raised about the competence of the shooters, deer rifles have to be high velocity, and the proximity to footpaths. Mr Jones assured the council that there is no shooting over footpaths and that the activities are properly managed by people with all of the correct qualifications. He said that the animals shot were not wasted but were butchered and processed through the kitchens ending up on the tearoom menu. He will arrange for Councillors to inspect the shooting sites and verify that there is no hazard to footpaths.

The July meeting finished at 8:30 pm. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Church Knowle Village Hall at 6:30 on 10th September 2024.



<u>Retirement of Martin Papworth | Archaeologist | National</u> <u>Trust | SW England</u>

38 years and 5 months ago, a bright-eyed archaeologist Martin
Papworth began his career within the National Trust. The year
was 1986 and he was on a four-week contract at Corfe Castle to
uncover a set of stairs in the Outer Gatehouse which had been

Trust uncover a set of stairs in the Outer Gatehouse which had been hidden by years of soil and rubble. He uncovered stairs which would have allowed knights access to the top levels of the Outer Gatehouse (the Gatehouse would have been double the height of which you see today).

Back then, Corfe Castle had only recently been bequeathed to the National Trust and there was a lot to do – not only with uncovering hidden archaeology but to create a more appropriate visitor route into the castle ruins. During these works, Martin and his team quickly discovered that visitors were fascinated with what they were up to, asking lots of questions and wanting to see what finds they had uncovered. From this, interactive activities and trails were created which allowed visitors to connect with history, which are still in use today.

As part of his swansong, Martin and a team of volunteers conducted a dig in

the Inner Ward at in an attempt to discover a hidden Sallyport. A Sallyport is essentially a back door – allowing residents to nip in and out of the castle without having to use a formal front entrance and one Sallyport was where Colonel Pitman and his men were able to sneak in to take the castle.

The top of an arch was already exposed and a scheduled monument consent from Historic England allowed Martin



to drop the ground surface by 0.5m - enough to empty part of the arch to test whether it continues through the thickness of the 11th century Inner Ward curtain wall. The work uncovered remains of meals - oyster and cockle shells, mutton and beef bones and even crab shell. There was white plaster and fragments of earthenware bowls and jugs with bright shiny yellow and green mottled glaze. To find out more about Martins last dig at the castle, search for Martin Papworth National Trust and you'll find his Archaeology blog. It will be sad to see Martin depart, however we are so grateful for all the work he has achieved and the huge contribution he has made to Corfe Castle. Enjoy your retirement Martin – it is thoroughly well deserved!

Civil war re-enactment Saturday 7 and Sunday 8 September

Please join us for the English Civil War Society's re-enactment of the siege of Corfe Castle on Saturday 7 and Sunday 8 September. Residents of the parish of Corfe Castle have free entry to the castle.

Events will begin with a military march from Castle View to the village on Saturday 7 at 10:45. They'll meet Lady Bankes asking her tenants to come into the castle and bring supplies.

Watch Lady Bankes dine with her friends as her cooks busy themselves preparing the food. Witness Pike and Musket drills as the soldiers prepare for battle. Soak up the sounds and smells of living history displays from authentic cooking and leatherwork to herbalists and coinmakers.

Each day will culminate in a battle re-enactment. Saturday: Siege of Corfe Castle. Watch as an attacking force tries to take the castle but are repulsed by a stout defence of castle inhabitants. Sunday: 'The Betrayal'. Watch in awe as the evil traitor Colonel Pitman betrays the castle before it is stormed by the Roundheads and the castle is taken for Parliament.

This event will involve firing of replica weaponry on each day which can be noisy:

Cannon fire - 12pm	Musket fire - 2:30pm

Nature updates from the National Trust

Sheep on the castle mound

Around 30 Hebridean sheep are grazing the castle mound until next spring. The nibbling of these hardy sheep will help control the growth of tor grass and other coarse vegetation, and keep the grassland open for wild plants such as marjoram, thyme, knapweed, harebells, viper's bugloss and wild carrot. These are

Our approach on the castle mound is to prevent the growth of trees and shrubs. This contrasts with the way we manage our other countryside sites, partly because we have to protect the mound as a scheduled monument, but also because of the steep slopes that make it difficult to carry out manual tasks.

Please keep your dogs on leads on the mound to prevent harm to the sheep.

Life in the old tree yet!

A magnificent wych elm which fell during the winter has been given a new lease of life. The tree toppled in Wilderness Wood, between Corfe Castle and Swanage, but luckily its root plate stayed intact. We placed deer fencing

around the tree to protect its foliage and seeds from being eaten. Our hope is that new stems will grow - and the tree will rise again as a 'phoenix tree'.

The canopy of such elm trees is a habitat for the rare white-letter hairstreak butterfly. Its name comes from the white streak on the underside of its wings.

Blues on the common

Areas of the common have turned violet-blue with the flowers of devil's-bit scabious.-This nectar-rich herb was traditionally used as a treatment for skin conditions, such as scabies and the boils of bubonic plague (the Latin

'scabere' means to scratch). Its common name comes from its truncated roots – said to have been bitten off by the Devil! It flowers from July to October.

Ragwort – a feast for pollinators

The golden flowers of ragwort are currently lighting up our grasslands and verges. Ragwort is hugely important for insects – around 178 species feed off it, 27 of which

only feed on ragwort. Of course, these insects are then food for birds, bats and other creatures. So why does this UK native plant get so much bad press?

Ragwort can be poisonous to cattle and horses if eaten in large quantities. But:

• Fresh ragwort smells and tastes horrible to these animals – they'll only eat it if there is no other food in the field.

• The problem is when ragwort gets into hay or silage as it loses its warning signals and animals can inadvertently eat it.

We follow the government's advice on ragwort control – clearing it when it's within 50m of fields used for grazing animals or growing fodder. Otherwise, we leave it as an amazing food source that helps sustain biodiversity.

Beavers settle in

It appears that the beavers at Little Sea, Studland, have built a lodge and have had their first babies (kits)! We aren't sure how many kits there are yet as they are very secretive. We're now preparing signage to go around the lake to protect both the wildlife and dogs. The messages are:

Keep your dog on a lead and don't let it swim in the water. Beavers aren't naturally aggressive but will defend themselves if they feel they or their kits are under threat.

- Little Sea provides a home to lots of vulnerable wildlife, not just beavers, so no swimming or watercraft are permitted.
- You're most likely to see a beaver if you are quiet by the water. They have a good sense of hearing and will quickly hide if scared.
- If you see a beaver, watch from a distance, preferably using binoculars. Please don't use lights to seerch for the beauer of this

lights to search for the beavers as this can distress them.

If you want to find out more, come to the Planet Purbeck celebration event on Friday 20 September, 7.30pm, at the Mowlem Theatre, Swanage. Our wetland project officer, Gen Crisford, will be talking about the beavers and our vision for their future in Dorset.

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Further to last months staffing list I would like to update you with the good news that our new dispenser, Sam has now started. Sam is a very experienced dispenser but has not worked in a dispensing practice before so please show understanding and patience whilst she gets to grips with the running of the dispensary.

Corfe Castle Surgery

We will be offering respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) vaccinations from 1 September to older adults aged 75-79, and to individuals from 28 weeks' pregnancy to protect their baby. If you are eligible, we will contact you with an appointment as soon as we can.

Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) is an enveloped RNA virus, in the same family as the human parainfluenza viruses and mumps and measles viruses. RSV is one of the common viruses that cause coughs and colds in winter. RSV is transmitted by large droplets and by secretions from contact with an infected person.

This years flu vaccines will not start in September as normal, but we will be contacting parents of all children aged 2 or 3 years (on 31 August 2024) and pregnant women for vaccination in September as advised to do so.

For everyone aged 65 and over and those of you aged 18 years to under 65 years and in a clinical risk group we will not be able to start vaccinating **until 3 October 2024**, this includes carers and frontline workers. This is based on the evidence that flu vaccine's effectiveness can wane over time in adults, JCVI (Joint committee on vaccination and immunisation) have advised moving the start of the programme for most adults to the beginning of October. This is on the understanding that the majority of the vaccinations will be completed by the end of November, closer to the time that the flu season commonly starts. It is preferable to vaccinate individuals closer to the time when the flu virus is likely to circulate (which typically peaks in December or January), as this will provide optimal protection during the highest risk period. As flu circulation in children normally precedes that in adults, the JCVI agreed that the children's programme should continue to start in September as early as delivery and supply allows.

I would expect for us to hold our first walk in flu session on Saturday 5th or 12th October. Please keep an eye on the website and in practice for confirmed dates.







Rev Anne Bond writes

What is this world coming to? Am I the only person despairing? Where has common sense gone?

It seems to me that what is happening is that in our eagerness to be kind and loving to each other, as a society we have leant so far over backwards to be considerate to everyone, we are losing our balance and are in danger of falling into a quagmire of ill-thought-out contradictory values, that at best may lead to occasional personal confusion, and at worst to serious wide-spread and escalating mental dysfunction. Already, amongst people young enough to be still developing into the adults they will eventually become, many find themselves questioning their essential identities as members of the human race. Ever since the world began people have been 'male' and 'female' in varying degrees; to be so is part of the rich variety of life. Thank goodness we no longer shun people whose physiological makeup compels them to prefer sexual partners of the same gender as themselves; it is just how they are made. As we develop from infancy to adulthood, it is 'normal' for one's sense of identity to shift uncomfortably – like a ball rolling about on an uneven and moving surface – until the moment comes when we settle into our final personal 'slot' of adulthood at the age of about 25 or so. To make long-lasting irreversible changes to one's physical appearance based on our perceptions of self-identity before approximately that age, seems to me to be not only foolish but extremely dangerous to both mental and physical health.

I had a chest X-ray this morning. If the Daily Telegraph is to be believed, I should have been asked if I was pregnant *even if I appeared to be a man.* As I am now 80 it was pretty clear I was not likely to be pregnant; common sense prevailed – hurray!

Immigration: we are an island. As a nation we have huge sympathy for refugees from war-torn countries whose homes have been destroyed and whose lives are in danger; we welcome them with loving hearts and open arms. But should we be welcoming immigrants who have willingly paid vast sums to enter this country illegally in the hope of earning similarly vast sums here rather than rather less in their own countries? Even if some have been coerced into doing so by ruthless profiteers? Soon there will be more immigrants than locals on this island and the overcrowding will cause us all to start sliding off the edges into the sea!

NHS: we used to welcome doctors and nurses from Commonwealth countries to work in the NHS, and very fine additions to hospitals and care homes they were too. Has Brexit made it impossible for them to work here now?

Government: civil servants, not politicians, seem to be running this country now at both national and local levels. For example, planning applications take months to resolve, with too many people having too many considerations clashing with each other for sensible decisions to be made.

Schools: can it really be true that some teachers have encouraged pupils to self-identify as *cats* in the classroom? Once again, I ask: where has common sense fled to?

In these letters I keep repeating that Jesus taught "Love the Lord your God with all your mind, heart, spirit and strength and love your neighbour as you love yourself." If we all actually put that into practise, a lot of wrongs would stand a good chance of becoming right.

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Swanage Skatepark Community Project raises £20,000 towards new skatepark equipment with Crowdfunder campaign!

The Swanage Skatepark Community Project (SSCP) is thrilled to announce that they have successfully reached their Crowdfunder goal, securing £20,000 for the rebuilding of Swanage Skatepark. Generous community donations totaling £14,000 enabled the project to receive an additional £6,000 in match funding from Sport England, providing a robust start to their fundraising efforts.

Heidi Florence from SSCP says: 'We're so grateful to the community for supporting our fundraising efforts over the past few months. Thanks to this collective effort, we not only reached our Crowdfunder target but have succeeded in giving Swanage Skatepark a sense of identity, and skatepark users feel like they belong to something. Running the Crowdfunder campaign and hosting our first Community Day have laid the foundations for building the vibrant skate community we want to see in Swanage.'

The fundraising campaign was initially planned to run for 8 weeks, but was extended to 12 weeks to allow extra time to reach the target. Success finally came at a recent Swanage Town & Community Partnership AGM when representatives from the Town Council and various local groups came together and voted unanimously to give a generous donation of £4,000 to the Swanage Skatepark Crowdfunder.

The work of Swanage Town & Community Partnership focuses on creating a vibrant, friendly community for everyone, supported by a thriving economy in a safe and healthy environment. Recent meetings have been focused on development of a youth strategy, and it was clear that the Swanage Skatepark Community Project is a key piece of that puzzle.

The Crowdfunder campaign was a community effort with local businesses offering rewards as an incentive for donations. In addition Swanage Badminton Club, Tilly's Ice Cream and Skate Not Bored all contributed generously to the donations.

Heidi Florence from SSCP says: 'Reaching our Crowdfunder target was crucial not only to secure match funding from Sport England but also to show grant-giving organisations that our community strongly supports the project. Potential funders will want to see that the skatepark is desired and backed by the community, and our Crowdfunder campaign clearly demonstrates this.'

The £20k from the Crowdfunder joins a pledge of £15k from Swanage Town Council bringing the total raised so far to £35k. With the target of not just replacing the removed ramps but improving and expanding the skatepark, SSCP are aiming to raise £200,000 to fully fund the project.

Next steps for the Swanage Skatepark Community Project are to use this springboard of community donations to apply to local and national grants. SSCP is already working on applications for three opportunities with deadlines in July and August. And, business sponsorship packages are currently in development.

The group also plans to host a follow-up to the June 1st 'Skatepark Community Day,' which saw hundreds of people enjoying the vibrancy of skatepark culture. This event is likely to take place in the autumn 2024. The group is seeking additional volunteers to help make this happen.

Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue – Kitchen Fires

During 2023, one third of the kitchen fires attended by Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service (DWFRS) were in the homes of people aged over 65 and living alone. To combat this alarming statistic, DWFRS is launching a new safety campaign, with a focus on preventing cooking-related incidents and making residents safer at home.

'Cook with Care' has four key themes to help reduce kitchen fires:

- **Prepare** Before you start cooking, create a clear space to prepare your meals safely. Keep tea towels and cloths away from the cooker and hob, and take care if you're wearing loose clothing.
- **Prevent** Never put anything other than pots and pans on your cooker hob; even after you've finished cooking, the hob will remain hot for some time. Never put anything metal into the microwave. Saucepan handles left sticking out create a danger; there's a risk they could be caught, leading to the pans being knocked off the hob.
- Focus Don't leave cooking unattended. Avoid cooking if you are tired, have been drinking alcohol or are taking medication that leaves you drowsy.
- Stay Safe Keep the oven, hob and grill clean as a build-up of fat or grease can catch fire when hot. Switch off the oven and/or hob when you have finished cooking and take pans off the heat.

It's vital that we do all we can to protect our communities, especially those people who are perhaps more vulnerable because of their age or where they live. By highlighting some of the potential dangers in the kitchen, DWFRS hope to encourage safer cooking behaviours amongst those most at risk. Religion is much in the news these days, but what about Jesus.....

Who did Jesus claim to be?

'Do you know what God is like? Look at Me!' In John 14:6. Jesus answered

'Don't you know me, Philip, even after I have been among you such a long time? Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, **'Show us the Father'?** Jesus claimed to speak for God and do the things that only God could do, such as forgiving sin. In spite of that, many people think of Him as just a great religious teacher, the founder of one of the world's religions. However, what Jesus said about Himself finds no equivalent in any other religions. In fact, quite the opposite.

Jesus was very different. He had a great deal to say about Himself. No one in their right mind would dream of saying the things Jesus said about Himself unless they were true. He could have been deluded, but when we look at the way Jesus lived, his compassion for people and the quality of his wisdom and teaching, it would be difficult to come to this conclusion.

C.S Lewis, the author of the Narnia stories, put it this way. 'I am trying to prevent anyone saying the really foolish thing that people often say about Him: 'I am ready to accept Jesus as a great moral teacher, but I don't accept His claim to be God.' That is one thing we must not say. A man who was merely a man and said the sort of things that Jesus said would not be a great moral teacher. He would be either a lunatic or the devil of hell. You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the Son of God; or else a madman or something worse. You can shut him up for a demon, or you can fall at His feet and call Him Lord and God. But don't come up about Him being a great moral teacher. He hasn't left that alternative open to us. He did not intend to'

You might think anyone can claim to be God. There have been such people, but the evidence of the way they lived did not support their claims. What makes Jesus unique is that the way He lived gives us every reason to believe that what He said was true. Jesus' character and work supports His words in a way that we see in no other human life. Are you willing to weigh up the evidence and come to a decision? Will you fall at His feet and call Him 'Lord'? Your eternal destiny will depend on your response!

Jesus answered, 'I am the way, the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me' John 14:6

Eyes to the skies

Well, my friends, Autumn bird migration is well underway, I'm sure most of you have noticed the birds gathering especially by coastal areas, having a last big feed up before setting off on their mammoth journey home. A daunting task for an experienced adult but I can't even imagine what it like for the young fledglings to have to do it for the first time; nature is amazing! But I do wonder what percentage of them make it?

Hopefully some of you have welcomed these summer visitors back again and again and have not been put off by the mess down your bedroom windows or in your porches and out buildings, you may even have put up nesting cups up for them, I always love the chatter of the barn swallows, sitting on the tree outside the tollgate and watching them swooping low as they head down the road to the sea or seeing them all perched on Clavell tower.

Pat went out mid-August down to the bay and had 5 wheatears on the beach and in the fields, with Whitethroat and chiff chaff in the hedgerows.

These will join the hirundines on their long journey home. September will continue with Autumn migration with the chance of a rarity getting lost and ending up in our own back yard of the bay. In 2020 on the 5th of September a Pectoral Sandpiper was found in stink corner that had got lost from its trip from North America to South America. How on earth did it end up in Kimmeridge!!!

This years exciting bird was a red footed booby that landed on a boat and promptly went to sleep for forty minutes before taking off again! James from Church Knowle has been doing regular seawatches in the bay and has been rewarded with various Shearwaters and a Sabines Gull that breeds in the high arctic .



Afflington Manor & Farm


The Tithing

Afflington Manor gave its name to the Tithing - an Anglo-Saxon administrative unit which formed a group of 10 households. Ten tithings were called a Hundred and Afflington Tithung was part of the 'Hundred of Ailwood' (or 'Rowbarrow Hundred' as it later became called). The actual Bronze Age barrow, where the Hundred court would have been held, lies in the garden of a bungalow at North Instow, Harmans Cross. The earliest reference so far found for this barrow is in a Pipe Roll of 1183 '*Rugebergahundredum*'.

Afflington Tithing spreads across more than one parish and Hundred (part was also in 'Hasilor Hundred'), and before 1066 was farmed by four Saxons - Ælfrun (a woman), Ledmer, Brictric and Leofwin. It also included land at Godlingston that was held by Durand the carpenter, and some land at Bushey. It was called '*Alvronetone*' overall. Each would have held their own farmstead in an enclosure close to a water source. Ælfrun and Brictric held the most land and King William claimed that, leasing part to Roger de Belmont/ Beaumont and the other to Walter de Clavile. Forty years after the Black death in 1381, the Afflington Tithing lists 14 householders spread around the area.

Afflington Farm

The farm (as opposed to the Tithing of the same name), has had various names - Alfrington, Alfrinton, Arflington, Alderington and Addlington - so it is not unsurprising that the Revd. Hutchins confused it with Adlington, near Bridport, and stated that Henry III granted a market and fair here in 1269. This never occurred because Corfe Castle being, less than 2 miles away, already held two weekly markets and two fairs. The actual hamlet lay to the east of the current farm and is under grassland. There appears to be no agreement as to how many cottages stood there – anything from 9-20. Quite when it was abandoned, is also unsure. The Historical Monuments Commission claim the hamlet was still occupied by the 17th century.

Francis Hawley (an MP for Corfe) 'the creature of Sir Christopher Hatton', as described by one writer, and who was hand in glove with the lawless Purbeck pirates he was supposed to suppress, leased the farm in 1574, just months after Hatton had bought it. One suspects he had little concern for the farm and when the Dackombe family took it on, it was somewhat dilapidated. By 1620, a new farmhouse had to be built near to the then current one. The house still stood in the Revd. Hutchins' day who describes it as large, and stone built; rebuilding occurred in the 19th century, and it has since been modernised.

In 1720, the Bankes family sold the farm to two barristers from the Middle Temple, and it passed to the Etterick family of Holt and eventually onto Thomas Fane, the Earl of Westmoreland. A descendant of his sold it in 1797 and it was put in trust for Edward Balston who left it to his two daughters. On his death, they sold it to the Earl of Eldon in 1822. It remained with the Scotts until 2004 when it was put up for sale.

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The Rambling Gardener

September is a beautiful month it used to be called the mellow fruitful month as there are lots of lovely days and fruitful because there is a lot to harvest; then this is a hard month as there a lot of wind and gales.

Deciduous plants, whether small or a big are, preparing for winter. Their leaves start to go all different colours, from the palest yellow to dark red, so rewarding where ever home is. If the wind is strong, it may change everything overnight.

Happy plants are healthy plants and will look good. Every area has its own climate so see what is doing well near you to see what can do well in your own garden. Everyone likes having their garden admired so do just that - admire and ask for some seeds or cuttings. If you get offered plants accept as these plants will be much better than anything you buy in the post. When transplanting water in well and cut them back hard as most plants thrive on being pruned hard when being transplanted.

Seeds to sow; red and black radish and hardy lettuce, also buy garlic onion sets and broad beans for sowing soon. With the changing weather I am just going to sow all the bare ground that i have with green manure crops and seeds that may grow if the weather is kind to them. Rye is very hardy but can be invasive, mustard grows very fast and when the frost comes it still gives a good cover to the soil rotted down by spring and ready to sow next year's summer crops. Phacelia is my favourite green manure as it will probably go through the winter and produce beautiful blue flowers which are full of nectar in the next year.

With the changing climate this year there has been mixed results in my harvests. I have had good crops of loganberries, raspberries, 16 peaches on a very small tree that lives in a pot and the kiwi looks like giving 1,000 fruits again this year. But I have had no apricots or pears and some of the apples are poor, though one local home has pear tree full of fruit! This may be because of it being colder or because there are just many fewer insects. I do usually take out plants that stop producing but I will give the fruit trees a bit of time and trust they adapt to the new weather.

In spite of the rain, so far there is no blight on the tomatoes outside but the rain has made the convolvulus and ground elder grow far too fast and it is taking a lot of time trying to stop them from swamping the other plants. The convolvulus I put on the compost but the ground elder I burn. Do stake tall plants, tie climbers, harvest whatever is ready for freezing, or store tomatoes, cucumbers, squash, onions, beans, cabbage and any other things you have.

I have been thinking about my grandmother who built Oldfeld School (now Harrow House) as a co-ed school for 100 pupils while her husband was working in India. At that time there was no electricity in Swanage, so she put up a windmill to make electricity and pump water. Also, an Aga was installed to save energy The school farm provided food for the pupils and the family. It was a very environmentally and sustainable way of life.

Please think before using sprays and enjoy the harvest during September. I always enjoy showing people round my garden, answering any questions you have. Hopefully finding you some plants to take home, this is the best time to transplant, so please do contact me.

<u>Murder, mystery and suspense on</u> <u>the Purbeck cliffs?</u>

Three years ago, I wrote a piece for the Corfe Valley News titled "*Purbeck's Precarious Puffins*". This described how the breeding colony of puffins that we have in Purbeck has declined by more than 90% over the last 50-60 years so that in most recent years there have been no more than 3 pairs. No-one

knows the cause of the decline. In early 2023 I wrote another article for the CVN titled "*Plenty more fish in the sea? – let's hope so*". In this I described the proposal by the UK and Scottish governments of the day to ban industrial fishing for sandeels (one of puffins' favourite foods) in the UK controlled parts of the North Sea. Thankfully, that ban is now in force and should be good news for all the seabirds that breed on the North Sea coasts including the puffins in Northumberland and Yorkshire. I mentioned in that article that I would spend some time in summer 2023 watching the Purbeck puffins to see if they were finding enough fish to feed their chicks.

As it turned out although the three pairs did bring in plenty of fish in 2023, they did this for no more than 3 weeks and then stopped. Pufflings need to be fed for 6 weeks before they can fly the nest. So, in 2023 our puffins did not breed successfully. This summer, with the help of a team of other volunteer puffin enthusiasts, we had the puffins under even closer observation. The National Trust and Dorset Wildlife Trust also installed three trail cameras on the cliff ledge on which the puffins nest to get even more insights into goings-on in puffindom.


Thankfully, all six puffins turned up in April this year and we saw them courting, mating and even bringing in bits of seaweed for their nests. So, we know three pairs started to breed again and they almost certainly all laid an egg (a pair of puffins only lay one egg a year). However, even with the tempting prize of a box of ChoCoco chocolate fish on offer to the first volunteer to spot a puffin carrying fish, and the ensuing frenzy of observation effort, not a single fish-carrying puffin was seen in 2024. This means two things. First, the bad news – the puffins did not hatch any eggs this summer. Second – the good news - there will be a roll over prize of 2 boxes of chocolate fish on offer in 2025!

So, we now have confirmation that in both 2023 and 2024 the Purbeck puffins have failed to rear any pufflings to independence. I suspect that this has been true in almost every year for a long time and is probably why they have declined to the point of near extinction in Dorset. One bit of good news though is that this year, as in most years, towards the end of June the maximum number of puffins seen (9 this year) was more than the maximum number seen between March and early June (6). This means a handful of other puffins, probably birds that are not quite old enough to breed, visited Purbeck this summer, perhaps to check out if this might make a good home in the future. So, all is not yet lost – but we urgently need to work out what is causing our puffins' eggs not to hatch or their chicks to die prematurely.

We hope to have recovered the trail cameras by the time this article appears and, if they have worked as planned, the images they have captured may give us the evidence needed to solve the mystery of Purbeck's declining puffins. I suspect it's going to be a bit of a who dunnit? I have my suspicions.

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
