Youth Club: Corfe Castle Parish Council is proud to continue its support of the Corfe Castle Youth Club for the upcoming academic year. The Youth Club welcomes children every Wednesday, with sessions from 5:30 PM - 6:45 PM for school years 6 and 7, and from 7:00 PM - 8:15 PM for school years 8 and above. As a friendly and inclusive space, the Youth Club provides a safe and enjoyable environment where young people can socialise, learn, and grow at their own pace. Led by experienced and qualified youth workers, the club offers a wide range of activities designed to foster personal development and build confidence. Youth members are encouraged to take an active role in organising events and shaping the club's program.

The club works closely with various agencies to offer support on issues affecting young people. If you or your friends have ideas for events or trips, feel free to chat with the leaders on club nights.

While there is a nominal ± 1 fee per session, no one will be turned away due to financial constraints. For more information, contact Donna at 01929 552 934.

Studland Ferry Fare Increase Proposal: In August, the Bournemouth-Swanage Motor Road and Ferry Company applied to the Secretary of State for Transport, requesting an increase in ferry fares and the introduction of a toll on Ferry Road. In response, Dorset Council swiftly acted, inviting Bournemouth, Christchurch, and Poole Council, all Purbeck town and parish councils, the National Trust, and other relevant stakeholders to form a united consortium to oppose the application. Corfe Castle Parish Council has officially lodged its objection with the Department for Transport and is awaiting further details from Dorset Council regarding the consortium's collective objection. The parish council is inclined to join this consortium.

Affordable Housing in Corfe Castle: Recently it was brought to our attention that Aster Housing was planning to sell one of their affordable homes in Corfe Castle. In response, the Parish Council promptly engaged with Aster Housing and other local stakeholders, hoping to collaborate to prevent the loss of affordable housing in our community. Unfortunately, in this case, we were informed that the sale process for the property is already too far along to be halted. However, discussions will continue regarding any potential future sales, as we remain committed to preserving affordable housing within the parish.

Corfe River: Corfe Castle Parish Council were invited and accepted an invitation from Church Knowles Parish Council to work together to approach Wessex Water concerning runoff into the Corfe River. Councillors were concerned at the very high and frequent sewage discharges which now take place. Significant investment is required to prevent this.

Corfe Castle Camping Sites: Earlier this year, new regulations were introduced that prevented several local temporary campsites from opening for business this summer. Cllr Wilson, Dorset Council Ward Councillor for Southeast Purbeck, has committed to collaborating with Dorset Council officers to ensure the process for obtaining the necessary licenses, is a smoother and more efficient procedure in the future.

Planning application update: The following applications have been received by Corfe Castle Parish Council, for full details including proposed works please see the Dorset Council website:

Application No: P/LBC/2024/04018 & P/HOU/2024/04017, **Location**: Ricketts Farm Cottage Ailwood To Tabbits Hill BH20 5JA, **Proposal**: Erect single storey extension to the east with demolition and removal of modern walls of loggia. New window openings to the pantry and WC and form new door opening in the gable end. Form a new door opening with steps to the old stable end, block up existing convoluted access to the rear stairs and reinstate the old stable door. **Comment** Corfe Castle Parish Council have no objection. This is a long-planned scheme, revised in accordance with the (previous) Conservation Officer's guidelines, and brings an old building (heritage asset) into use for the 21st century. Slate tiles, Purbeck stone and black cast-iron gutters and downpipes are all specified. The proposed footprint is pretty much the same as the house which was originally in this location.

Application No: P/LBC/2024/04224, Location: 49 East Street, BH20 5EE

Proposal: Replace the existing damaged wood framed windows with new wood framed windows. **Comment** Corfe Castle Parish Council have no objection. This is a like to like repair for necessary works.

Application No: P/LBC/2024/04435, **Location**: The Old Post Office 16 West Street Kingston BH20 5LH, **Proposal**: Window replacement/repairs. **Comment** No objection. However, request a condition be placed to ensure the front door colour be based on the existing colour unless there is a historical precedent for a different colour.

Application No: P/LBC/2024/03662, **Location**: 2 Boar Mill Cottage East Street BH20 5ED, **Proposal**: · Stripping and reinstating the shower room roof · The removal of cementitious render to the chimney and section of adjacent wall· Repairing the first-floor lath and plaster ceilings to the bedrooms· Replacing window casements· Installing new extractor fans to the shower room and kitchen · Increasing the size of the rainwater goods· Relocating the boiler· Demolition of the modern concrete store, **Comment** No objection. This application will bring a currently unusable building into use (albeit as a holiday cottage). Heritage materials are proposed, and the removal of the concrete store can only be an improvement. **Application No:** P/HOU/2024/04593, **Location**: Little Woolgarston Farmhouse Corfe Castle BH20 5JE, **Proposal**: Raise eaves, re-roof existing dwelling, erect first floor rear extension., **Comment** No Objection. What is proposed will make the house much more in keeping within the local area (replacing concrete and pebbledash with Purbeck stone, concrete roof tiles with slate).

Application No: P/LBC/2024/04644 & P/HOU/2024/04643, **Location**: 49 East Street BH20 5EE, **Proposal**: Installation of roof over existing well to create new covered 'link' between the cottage and the bakehouse, **Comment** No objection, as no detrimental effect on a Listed Building.

Application No: P/FUL/2024/04128, **Location**: Lifton Valley Road Harmans Cross BH19 3DX, **Proposal**: Sever land, erect replacement 3 bedroomed single storey bungalow with raised decking, **Comment** No comment. This property is in Langton Matravers Parish, but borders Corfe Castle Parish.

Application No: P/TRC/2024/04657, **Location**: Bartholomews The Square BH20 5EZ, **Proposal**: T1 Small Holm Oak Sapling: Fell. T2 Group of Holm Oaks: Crown lift to 4m **Comment** No objection

Application No: P/TRC/2024/04833, **Location**: Littlemead, West Street, BH20 5HE, **Proposal**: T1 Apple tree - Crown reduction by up 0.5m. T3 Elm - Fell. T4 Leaning Pine tree - Prune overextended limbs by up to 0.75m. Crown raise by removing the two lowest branches, **Comment**: No objection

Church Knowle Parish Council - September Meeting

The September meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Church Knowle Village Hall on Tuesday 13th August 2024 at 6:30pm. It was attended by all eight members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair) and three members of the public.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Vacancies on the Parish Council

There is still one vacancy on the council which has a full strength of nine and any interested parishioners can apply to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk.

Public Discussion Period

Mr Matthew Estop, the landlord of the New Inn at Church Knowle, notified the Parish Council that his application for Certificate of Lawful Development to ratify the camping and recreational vehicle parking operations in the grounds to the rear of the pub had been refused. He said that the loss of revenue from visiting motor homes would adverse effect the viability of the pub and could lead to its closure over winter. Further he would have to install a gate to close off the car park during the night that would be an expense and result in a loss of parking for residents who habitually use this car park.

The Parish Council, and many parishioners, had supported the application and it was decided that the Parish Council would contact the Dorset Council department and make a strong case for having this decision re-examined. Church Knowle has no Post Office or shop and the New Inn, as well as being an active business supporting tourism in the parish performs a useful social function as a meeting place. The loss of this business would have a serious impact on the parish.

Mr Hole of Bradle presented the revisions to his planning application, saying that the scheme was very much as originally submitted but that he had been advised that the changes would require an application.

Planning

P/VOC/2024/04836 – Alterations to cottages at Bradle - The Parish Council resolved to support the application.
 P/LBC/2024/04208 – Repairs to chimney 11 & 12 Church Knowle - The

Parish Council resolved to support the application.

Wessex Water and the Corfe River.

The Parish Council has contacted the Corfe Castle, Arne and Kimmeridge parishes that border the Corfe River to form a unite group to address the dumping of untreated sewage into the river by Wessex Water. Wessex Water must invest in peak storage facilities to allow all sewage to be properly treated before any discharge into the river. This initiative has the full support of the parish council.

The rules regarding septic tanks have been made more rigorous in recent years and a comprehensive guide can be found on the government website at *https://www.gov.uk/permits-you-need-for-septic-tanks*.

The Playing Field

There will be a working group to treat the woodwork with preservative as recommended in the latest inspection.

The Ward Councillor's Report.

The Ward Councillor Ben Wilson attended the meeting and gave an update on Dorset Council matters affecting the parish including more parish input into planning and the Big Conversation community consultation. A useful briefing paper on what the Dorset Council is seeking to emphasise can be found on the parish council's website under Notices.

He said that owing to the objections to the proposed Sandbanks Ferry fare increases a public enquiry would be held later in the year.

The Neighbourhood Plan.

This is progressing and will be undertaking a housing needs survey.

Road Closure in October.

The road to Church Knowle will be closed for a period on 30th October to facilitate changing a telegraph pole. See Parish Council website under Information -> Notices.

The September meeting finished at 8:08 pm. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Furzebrook Village Hall at 6:30 on 8th October 2024.

Thoughts on Shopper-Power...

Everyone does shopping. Some folk love it, some hate it, but either way there's more to it than just how much things cost.

Apart from price, how do you choose what food items to buy? Ideally are you looking for something which is ethically and environmentally produced, of local origin or low food-miles*, with fair-trade ingredients or components? Do you consider the packaging? Can it be bought loose or in a biodegradable bag or with minimal and recyclable packaging? Do you take you own bags with you?

Apart from food shopping, Charity Shops provide opportunities to pick up bargains and allow others to make use of your cast-offs, while benefitting a good cause.

Where do you shop – in the Village, Wareham or Swanage, Dorchester or Poole/Bournemouth? Or do you mainly shop on-line?

Leading up to the recent election a news item featured a worthy citizen saying the next government needed to stop high-street shops closing to keep town and village centres alive. But shops need customers; it's out-of-town shopping malls, mail-order, internet buying and delivery vans (especially since Covid) which has kept folk away from the high street.

So, by choosing what you buy and where you buy it, you can help the planet and the people on it.

*A few years ago I was on holiday in South Africa, and bought a bottle of cheap but drinkable local wine Great, I thought; we were supporting local producers. However, on reading the small print, it transpired that the wine had indeed been made in South Africa, but then shipped to the UK for bottling, and shipped back to South Africa for selling as 'locally produced'! But we still drank and enjoyed it, in spite of the high food-miles!

Conservation to the castle walls is continuing in October, with work taking place on the West Bailey curtain and inner walls, Butavent Tower, North Tower and tumbles on the outer slopes.

Visitor experience

We have just installed a new family quest called Castle Critters which highlights the nature that lives here with us. We'll also be hosting adventurous teddy's on our teddy zip wire, and a small pumpkin display for October half term. We also have our first guided bat walk on 31 October 16.30 – 18.30. Learn all about these incredible creatures while enjoying being inside the castle walls at night. The event is free but tickets need to be booked via our website.

Nature updates from the National Trust

A herald of good luck and joy at Corfe Castle

National Trust Nuge bird perching on top of the keep. The bird was a white stork, traditionally considered to be harbingers of hope, joy and rebirth.

Storks are a native species that was once widespread in the UK, but they disappeared over the centuries, probably due to habitat loss, hunting and persecution. The

myth that newborn babies are delivered by storks probably arose because they are white – linked to purity – and often build their large nests on church towers, close to where people live.

Storks feed on small mammals, earthworms, snails and large insects in watermeadows and grasslands. Several storks have been recorded on the Corfe River in recent years. These could be migrants from Europe, or ones from reintroduction projects in Sussex. Let's hope they become a regular sight here. Do let us know if you spot one.

What will be caught on camera?

The puffin cameras we placed on the cliff near Dancing Ledge have been removed by high ropes experts. Volunteers are now underway with the painstaking task of studying the images taken by the motion-sensor cameras - over 65,000 stills!

We know that three breeding pairs of puffins returned to the ledges this year but sadly it appears that no chicks survived to fledge. We're hoping the footage will tell us why.

Speed dating for bats

Did you know that Winspit Quarry in Worth Matravers is a nationallyimportant swarming site for bats? Under cover of darkness, these strange creatures fly from miles away to find a mate and hibernation spot. Corfe probably sits right under the bat super-flyway!

To find out more about this bat speed dating, we've mounted detectors on three poles in the quarry. They are picking up audio recordings, indicating the type and number of bats using the caves. Purbeck has 15 of the UK's 17 types of breeding bat, although not all of them swarm.



The technology will back up the amazing work that

volunteers from the Dorset Bat Group are doing to monitor the site. Working under licence, they trap bats in nets, measure them and record their size, weight and sex. They are then ringed on their forearms – previous tags have shown that some bats come to Winspit from as far away as 27 kilometres.

Please note most of the swarming takes place in the dead of night, with different bats arriving at different times. And remember that Winspit Quarry is closed to the public for safety reasons.

NEWS FROM THE PURBECK SCHOOL

1. Record GCSE Results

The School is celebrating its best ever GCSE results, measured by overall results and the additional progress students have made on their expected grades. Nationally school results were down as marking returned to the pre Covid scheme but they were up at Purbeck.

On overall attainment, 72% of students received five passes (grade 4-9) including English and Maths, this compares to the average across the country of around 65%. Many students did exceptionally well, with 71 students posting at least one grade 9 or 8, the very top grades.

Schools are now measured on progress compared with results at primary school. Projections would suggest that The Purbeck School students gained at least a half a grade higher for each subject than expected, this will place the school **in the top 10% of schools in the country.** The school was also proud to post exceptional results for students with special educational needs, and those who have come from more disadvantaged backgrounds. All groups of students have posted superb results.

The results mean more students are able to proceed to the sixth form to do A levels, go to college, or gain an apprenticeship.

2. Excellent A level results

The A level results were also excellent. The vast majority of students were able to take their first-choice university placements. In all, 9 students gained A*-A across all their subjects and over half of all grades were A* to B.

3. Other news

The school is full at year 7 for this September and we look forward to pupils living in the Isle of Purbeck applying for entry next year. The Open Evening for prospective parents is on October 3^{rd} (5.30 - 8pm). The evening is an excellent opportunity to tour the modern facilities, meet the committed teaching team, and be escorted around the school by our wonderful students.

4. We are fortunate that we are served by such an excellent 11-18 comprehensive school and the staff, its leadership, and students should all be congratulated on having such a successful 2024.



<u> 3^{rd} </u> September – We were delighted that at our September meeting Maggie Hardy and her colleague Mary Buck came to explain how to use defibrillators. This was an open meeting and we were pleased to be joined by so many guests. The demonstration was extremely helpful, and if it means that in the future even one person can be aided by a defibrillator in the village it will have been a very worthwhile event.

1st October - Connor Winter from the 'Greenbrick Workshops' that recycle bottle tops will be telling us all

about the project. The 'Greenbrick Workshops' was founded by Ben Gibbons and Connor Winter after the pair were forced by the Covid-19 pandemic to return to the UK from Nepal, where they had been working with rural communities to reduce the damage caused there by plastic pollution. 'Greenbrick Workshops' use cutting edge technology to wash and shred waste plastic, then heat and mould this into bricks. The bricks are used to build affordable homes in some of the poorest countries in the world. The Project initially aimed to establish 1,000 workshops over 10 years, which it hoped would prevent around six million tonnes of carbon dioxide being released from plastic burning and during the production



of clay bricks and cement. Potentially this would also allow for the recycling of around 800,000 tonnes of plastic that may otherwise end up in oceans - around 1% of global ocean plastic leakage. It will be fascinating to find out how far the Project has come over the last four years and to know where the plastic bottle tops we collect at Aquarius go!



Corfe Castle Gardening Club.

As the evenings draw in and there is a distinct chill in the air, our thoughts turn to plans for our gardens for the new year and taking stock of our success or otherwise this year. The unpredictable weather is a constant challenge and will inform our choice of plants in the future. Will you be redesigning any part of your plot, maybe growing more vegetables and fruits, raised beds, pergolas, reconsidering the position of plants that haven't been successful? We will continue to harvest the bounty from our labours and there are still bulbs to plant for the spring.

In September, we were delighted to welcome expert lepidopterist Dr.Martin Warren OBE who has been active in butterfly conservation for over 50 years. His wide-ranging talk included the best food plants for butterflies, moths and their caterpillars, including stinging nettles, ivy, scabious, honesty, long grass and of course buddleia. Caterpillars don't thrive in wet grass and this may be a cause of lower numbers this year.

It was interesting to learn that 50% of butterfly species are in decline but 50% are increasing in numbers.

We have many more moths in the UK compared to butterflies and they are responsible for a huge amount of unseen pollination. There are 3000+butterfly monitors around the country.

Our programme for the rest of the year:

October 3rd. Fiona Forsyth will give us an illustrated talk about the wonderful 'Formal and Relaxed Gardens of France'.

November 7th, Estate Manager Owen Davies and Head Gardener Sophy Robertson will be with us for a talk on Athelhampton. It will be a fascinating evening and wonderful to hear about the challenges and development of these beautiful gardens.

Dorset and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue – Kitchen Fires

During 2023, one third of the kitchen fires attended by Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service (DWFRS) were in the homes of people aged over 65 and living alone. To combat this alarming statistic, DWFRS is launching a new safety campaign, with a focus on preventing cooking-related incidents and making residents safer at home.

'Cook with Care' has four key themes to help reduce kitchen fires:

- **Prepare** Before you start cooking, create a clear space to prepare your meals safely. Keep tea towels and cloths away from the cooker and hob, and take care if you're wearing loose clothing.
- **Prevent** Never put anything other than pots and pans on your cooker hob; even after you've finished cooking, the hob will remain hot for some time. Never put anything metal into the microwave. Saucepan handles left sticking out create a danger; there's a risk they could be caught, leading to the pans being knocked off the hob.
- Focus Don't leave cooking unattended. Avoid cooking if you are tired, have been drinking alcohol or are taking medication that leaves you drowsy.

• Stay Safe - Keep the oven, hob and grill clean as a build-up of fat or grease can catch fire when hot. Switch off the oven and/or hob when you have finished cooking and take pans off the heat.

It's vital that we do all we can to protect our communities, especially those people who are perhaps more vulnerable because of their age or where they live. By highlighting some of the potential dangers in the kitchen, DWFRS hope to encourage safer cooking behaviours amongst those most at risk.



Swalland Farm

The farm, now part of the Smedmore Estate, used to lie in Corfe Castle parish and belonged to the Abbess of Shaftesbury. It has been rebuilt where 'Chaldecots Farm' was situated according to Rosemary Maw (DNHAS 1981). She noted 'that there may have been continuous occupation in the area of this settlement from the earliest Iron Age to the 17th century'. Rope Lake Head, lying on the coast, is the start of the old Saxon boundary and is also the current parish boundary between Corfe Castle and Kimmeridge. Maw thought that Swalland Farm was further to the east which made it lie inside Corfe Castle parish. Hutchins placed the property in Corfe Parish as well.



OS 1888 map from the National Library of Scotland.


In 1376 a wreck occurred off Kimmeridge Bay and Robert and John Swanlond are mentioned amongst a large list of those taking away items belonging to the ship called 'The Welfare' sailing from Dartmouth. It is likely the Swanlonds took their surnames from this place which A. D. Mills from 'Dorset Place Names' says means 'land of the herdsman/men'.

At the dissolution it passed to the crown and by the 1540s, it consisted of 3 cottages which were leased to George Chaldecot as he already owned the adjoining land called 'Chaldecots'. Maw concluded that the merging of the two farmsteads resulted in Chaldecots Farm becoming the present Swalland Farmhouse. The Chaldecots had farmed in Purbeck since the mid 1200s. The surname ceased to exist in 1641 when the property passed by marriage to the Thistlethwaites of Winterslow, Hampshire. In 1756, George Clavell purchased Swalland Farm and Chaldecotts for £3,150 and they became part of the Smedmore Estate.

During WWII, the land was requisitioned by the military to the SE of the farm, and this expanded to include Swalland Farm and Little Kimmeridge. According to the Rapid Coastal Zone Assessment Survey, this area became a tank firing range with deeply cut roadways and turning ovals.

- being more prone to physical health problems, such as colds, infections, or other illnesses



The Rambling Gardener.

October is a beautiful autumn month with lovely autumn colours on the various trees. There may be bad gales, but the shorter days means lovely long evenings to enjoy with friends in front of a fire after eating a good meal. I have been having fun looking at old photos and thinking how lucky I am to have done and seen so many things when younger and stronger. I also remember galloping over the hills and using the horses when petrol was restricted. It was such fun driving our carthorse up the main road to feed the animals or using a pony to sweep hay to the hayrick. I was always happy to jump out of bed to get outside before school for chores, it never seemed to rain or be cold and snow was just so exciting. I was so lucky everything was fun to me - even school work.

In the garden I don't know quite what we should be doing as it is hard to predict what to do with the changing climate. This year I have had no Apricots or Pears; do I have to hand pollinate or were the pollinating insects not around? We have had less moths this year, and I would like all lights to be switched off by midnight as I think that it could be light pollution affecting the moths, not a lack of food for their caterpillars.

However, this month I will continue the autumn attempt to get rid of invading convolvulus and move self-seeded forget-me-nots to better locations. We should harvest pumpkins and dig any potatoes that are still in the ground – my potatoes keep in the garage in a dark, covered box until May each year, just rub off any shoots before use. Also plant garlic, shallots, onions and bought spring cabbage seedlings (my seeds did not come up). I hope to find bare rooted cabbage plants as they will not cost too much; individual pots are more expensive and their roots will have been cramped. Under cloches plant winter radish, both black (for harvesting all winter) and red (to finish by Christmas), broad beans, carrots, beetroot and winter cabbages or greens. Sow green manure like phacelia, clover or mustard in any bare earth to add nutrients to the soil over the winter.

On a nice day wrap up warm and go out with a pen and pad. Decide what plants should be a) divided, b) removed, c) protected, and note down jobs to do during the winter. I love the Purbeck stone we have here and during this winter I need to replace some rotten wood with stone or more wood, and I look forward to building another pond. We will leave the rotten wood on the soil to feed the wildlife and soil.
