

Speeding: The Parish Council frequently receives correspondence about speeding vehicles along East Street. We understand your frustrations and are determined to make a difference, but we can't do it alone. Real change requires everyone to play their part.

To prove the need for speeding interventions, we need your help. If you or someone you know has been involved or are involved in the future in a non-injury collision or near miss specifically on East Street, please report it to Dorset Council. Even if no one was hurt, these reports are crucial in showing the need for action. For example, if you went to cross at the zebra crossing and had to jump back quickly because a car coming over the hill didn't see you, please **REPORT IT**. Without these reports, Dorset Council simply conclude that no intervention is necessary. Every report matters, it's a small step you can take to help make our community safer. You can log reports online at Dorset Council's Road Safety page https://www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/roads-highways-maintenance/road-safety. Let's work together to ensure our voices are heard!

Emergency Response Plan: Months ago, Cllr Blinkhorn took on the important task of drafting a Parish Emergency Response Plan. A preliminary version of the plan was presented at the December Parish Council meeting, where it was well-received for its potential to ensure that residents of Corfe Castle will never face a local emergency alone. The Parish Council commends Cllr Blinkhorn for his hard work and dedication to this vital initiative. Further details will be shared as the plan progresses toward final approval.

Parking Issues: The Parish Council regrets to inform residents that the request for West Street parking restrictions, while accepted by Dorset Council, has not yet ranked highly enough to secure funding. Although this delay is disappointing, the application remains active in the system. When the project reaches the top of the priority list, work will begin. We have asked our Dorset councillor for support. We appreciate your patience as we continue to advocate for this improvement.

Dorset Town of Culture 2026: Corfe Castle Parish Council has recently been invited to participate in Swanage Town Council's bid to become part of a Purbeck wide 'Town of Culture' 2026. At this stage, no decision has been made regarding our involvement. For further updates, keep an eye on the January agenda, where we hope to welcome a representative from Swanage Town Council to provide more details.

Council Tax 2025-26: During the January 2025 meeting we will be setting our Precept for 2025-26.

Community Bus Grant: Corfe Castle Parish Council are applying for a Community Bus grant, which will enable us to carry out a feasibility study. Watch this space for updates.

Planning application update: Full details for all planning applications can be found on the Dorset Council website, https://www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/planning-buildings-land/planning. The following applications have been received by Corfe Castle Parish Council:

Application: P/HOU/2023/07255; **Location**: 168 East Street, Corfe Castle, BH20 5EH. **Proposal**: Erect ground floor rear extension, side extension and loft conversion to dwellinghouse. Demolish existing garage and construct a garage / workshop with office. **Comment**: No Objection: The current garage is heavily overgrown but there is sufficient area around it to accommodate the proposed plans. It is outside the Conservation Area so we cannot be prescriptive about the materials used, though it is good to see that they are proposing to use mainly Purbeck stone (the home office being timber clad). Although the proposed extensions / alterations will unbalance the row of three dwellings it is providing a home for a growing family and again it is outside the Conservation Area

Next Council Meeting. The next meeting is scheduled for Monday 13th January 2025, at 7pm in the Corfe Castle Village Hall, Bill Carter Room. To start the meeting is a public session, so please come and join us and have your say.

Church Knowle Parish Council

The December meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Furzebrook Village Hall on Tuesday 10th December 2024 at 6:30pm. It was attended by five members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair) and nine members of the public.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

Clearing Work at Cotness Lakes

The tree clearing work at Cotness Lakes has prompted concern and complaints from the nearby residents who want assurances that what is proposed will not by noisy or disruptive to the community. Mr Cook who is doing the work and Mr Alford who owns the site presented their plans and answered questions from the Council and the public. Mr Cook intends to return the lake to its former use as a fishing spot and eventually provide some cabins where people can stay. Many of the trees were diseased, overhanging areas where people would pass and were presenting a safety risk. The site had been visited by Forestry and Dorset Council and they were satisfied that all was in order. An application has been made to the Dorset Council Tree Officer and when this has been approved the work will continue. An assurance was given that any work or development requiring formal permission will be applied for in the usual manner, that it was very much a local project and any concerns of the residents would be addressed.

It was agreed that many of the complaints were owing to the natural concern in the countryside when trees are being felled and that communication in this instance was essential. The Parish Council is always a good forum for this and we thanked Mr Cook and Mr Alford for taking the trouble to attend and let everyone know what is proposed.

Dorset Council

Dorset Councillor Ben Wilson said that the main item concerning Purbeck was the statutory Public Inquiry triggered by the application by the Ferry Company to increase its fares yet again. The venue for the inquiry is to be in Poole which is unpopular with the people in Purbeck who are most affected and it will held in January. More can be found on the ferry company website.

Planning

P/VOC/2024/03369 Barnhouse, Whiteway Farm, Steeple. New garage building. The parish council had no objection to the application.

Wessex Water and the Corfe River.

The clerk and Councillor Newns attended a meeting with Wessex Water executives in Dorchester about the overspills from their sewage treatment works into the Corfe River and Wessex Water's proposed program of works to deal with this. The Corfe River has the attention of the Chief Executive and it was a very productive and worthwhile meeting. A visit to these local sewage treatment works will be arranged in the new year and anyone interested in being invited can contact the clerk.

The meeting finished at 7:40 pm after which there was an informal gathering involving mince pies. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Church Knowle Village Hall at 6:30 on 14th January 2024.

This month we have some ideas for a nature based (late) New Year's Resolution

Explore a new wild place in Purbeck (or further afield) once every season Tread a new path, breathe fresh, clean air and reconnect with nature. With the wonderful variety of coastline and countryside we have on our doorstep, there's hopefully somewhere new for you to discover. Seeking out a new place to explore four times a year should be an achievable goal.

Learn more about the nature around us

Resolutions are often about learning a new skill or talent – perhaps a language or a musical instrument. Broaden your horizons by learning more about a new subject, like the environment around us. Knowing more about the nature we see every day helps us to better appreciate it – and we can learn how to protect it too. Why not try the Woodland Trust Tree ID app? This is available for iPhones and Android phones and can be used to identify the UK's native and non-native trees.

Contribute to a Citizen Science project

You can be a citizen scientist. The records collected by citizen scientists are enormously valuable to our understanding of biodiversity. It would be impossible to collect all the data needed to protect nature without the help of volunteers. This data is vital to aid our understanding of the natural world, helping to protect species and habitats, and informing research, policy and management. The Dorset Environmental Records Centre has details of projects you can get involved in, including the RSPB's Swift Mapper, or the Amphibian and Reptile Conservation's Garden Dragon Watch.

Watch a wildlife webcam

Unable to access a nature reserve? Another wonderful way to engage with nature is by viewing wildlife from the comfort of your own home via a webcam! Dorset Wildlife Trust's has three wildlife webcams up and running; the barn owl webcam at Lorton Meadows where the owl parents are still sheltering after their chicks have fledged, and two webcams situated on the Brownsea Lagoon, looking out from the Tern and Avocet Hides.

The Kings' View

National

Trust

Following permission from Historic England, we have erected a viewing platform within the Keep at the height of the former royal living quarters of the castle. Until now, this part of the castle has been inaccessible except to conservation teams on ropes. The platform is stand-alone, so it doesn't impact the structure and will be in place for up to a year while conservation works are in progress.

The platform not only offers panoramic views but also provides close-up views of rare historical features. One notable feature is an 'appearance door' built for King Henry I to show himself to the local public, much like the balcony at Buckingham Palace is used today. The castle served as both a royal residence and a private home for 500 years, and it's fascinating to see up close the various internal and external home improvements made to keep up with changing fashions.

Kings' View tours are an additional cost and all funds raised will go directly towards the conservation effort. Please see website for further details.

2025:

Alongside our usual school holiday activities and events, this year we've got a Mothers Day activity 29 & 30 March, the Vikings are back at the castle (300 of them!) 3-5 May to recreate the siege of Wareham, Living History weekends

in June and July, Food and Drink festival in July, Summer theatre and cinema in August, and the English Civil War Society are back to recreate the siege in September. We hope to welcome you back soon.

Other news:

We're delighted to have been given a commendation for *Rang Barse: Colours over Corfe Castle* within the Tourism Event/ Festival of the Year category at the Dorset Tourism Awards.

The event, which attracted 3,000 people was in partnership with BPC Indian Association to bring all cultures together for Holi – the Hindu festival celebrating the arrival of spring with vibrant colours, music and dance.

Nature updates from the National Trust

Haunting the heaths

One of nature's most haunting calls can be heard over the Purbeck Heaths this season. The curlew, with its distinctive 'cur-lee' call, is our largest wader, and also one of the most endangered. They move

to the coastline for the winter and survive on a diet of worms, shellfish and



shrimps. Watch for them probing in the mud with their long beaks to find food, which they often toss into the air before swallowing!

A fantastic place to watch curlews is from the bird hide on Middlebere Heath – numbers have increased now the land is being managed in naturefriendly ways. Please don't disturb any of the

overwintering birds you see – they need their energy for feeding and surviving the cold.

The 'shrieker of the woods'

Another bird you often hear, rather than see, is the jay. This colourful crow is shy and secretive but gets the name 'shrieker of the woods' from its loud screaming calls. You might spot one on Corfe Common looking for the acorns they stashed over the autumn as winter food.



- Many of the oak trees you see will have been planted by Jays. Even though they have a brilliant memory, some of the acorns they bury inevitably get left to grow into trees. A single jay can bury some 5,000 acorns in a season.
- Jays can mimic the calls of other birds and animals, and even sounds like mobile phones and car alarms! They often use these noises when threatened.

Gorse – the burning question

With bright yellow flowers and coconut scent, gorse is a familiar and muchloved feature of our countryside. It also provides food and shelter for wildlife. So why do we burn it?

The answer is that we burn small areas of gorse on the Purbeck Heaths and Corfe Common because without control, it will quickly take over the heathland, causing the loss of light-loving plants and insects, and blocking



flammability also makes it a serious wildfire hazard in dry conditions. Burning is carried out in winter by skilled rangers or contractors. <u>Read more</u> <u>about it here</u>.



News from the Library



Learn about the old shops of Corfe with Louise Haywood

We all remember shops that no longer exist in Corfe but the scale of change today is nothing compared to the scale of change in historical terms. Before the advent on the motor car Corfe had to be virtually self-sufficient in terms of shops and had a multitude of industries aside from those associated with quarrying and clay mining. In the 19th century these included two blacksmiths, a carpenter's shop, a tannery, a brew house, a timber yard, three bakeries, a slaughterhouse, a malthouse and even more pubs than we have now.

Local historian Louise Haywood returns to talk to us about the old shops in an illustrated talk on January 17th 2025 in the Village Hall's Bill Carter Room at 2.00pm. 

And January will be here, that most difficult of all months, when the bills come in, when maybe we realise that we have spent far too much on our gifts and celebrations, when the world we live in is at its coldest and darkest: with no Christmas celebrations, no pretty lights, no family visits, no extravagant food, nothing to cheer us. I've been struck recently by the write-ups on a book called "Wintering" by Katharine May. Encouraging us to embrace the depths of winter, the lack of light, the times which might be inviting us to rest more and to be renewed. Maybe there is something about this difficult time of year which is very necessary for us as humans. That is certainly the case in the natural world, where some animals hibernate, and most plants lose their leaves and halt their growing. What is there about this season that we can take on board to enhance our lives?

Seasons are important in nature. And seasons can be important in the Church year too. We're moving from the season of Christmas to the season of Epiphany, which means "revelation". A season that reminds us to ask God to reveal new paths he invites us to follow, like the star guiding those wise men (and maybe women!) in the dark of night to Christ. A season to find rest, renewal, a new beginning, in the one who grew into a man and said, "Come unto me all you who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest for your soul."



Swanage Streams Project

Local residents are being invited to take part in a ground-breaking river restoration and flood protection project.

The call to action follows the formation of a body known as Swanage Streams Partnership – a collaboration between the National Trust, Dorset National Landscape, community group Planet Purbeck and Swanage Town Council.

It is already looking at the grim state of Swanage's Swan Brook and its catchment area, which stretches to Langton Matravers, Harmans Cross and Ulwell, and the flooding risk it poses.

But the group is also keen to draw in local people to help resolve issues such as drainage, pollution, nutrient levels and struggling natural habitat – making it a significant community project.

The partnership will be formally launched at The Swanage School on the evening of Tuesday November 26. And all, whether they are individuals,

landowners or action groups, are invited to come along to learn about steps that will be taken and the potential for getting involved.

The need for intervention on Swan Brook is pressing. Its condition is officially classified as "poor" by the Environment Agency and it is therefore considered a failing watercourse in need of improvement. And there is a notable risk of flooding despite Swanage's alleviation infrastructure.

Such waterways are sometimes known as "Cinderella" streams because they are relatively neglected compared to nationally recognised rivers such as Wareham's Frome and Piddle.

Ian Rees, Countryside Projects Manager of Dorset National Landscape, said: "We are particularly interested in small streams like Swan Brook that aren't designated, have no spotlight on them and often aren't on anyone's agenda to look after them. So if no one else is doing it, it's up to us."

Mr Rees said the project offers Purbeck residents a chance to "improve the health of their back garden".

He added: "It will get you together with a group of likeminded people to tackle an issue close to your heart. You can make a difference by improving the environment

for people and for wildlife. It's good for the soul."

Planet Purbeck has been tasked with engaging the community in the project and raising awareness through various events such as talks, tours of existing flood defence systems and demonstrations of helpful activities that can afterwards be self-led.

Luke M Luke, Planet Purbeck's co-leader, said: "We're proud to unite with such top-tier partners to help transform Swan Brook and surrounding streams.

"Their current state is pretty shocking. But with the help of the Purbeck community we hope to foster a legacy of fun and sustainable practices to rejuvenate these precious habitats."

And the result is a nine-week course called Thrive In Nature, run free of charge by wellbeing experts Sara Greenwood and Jane Woods.

Sara, whose services under the name Vibrant Earth include "nature and forest therapy," said: "If you're feeling anxious, depressed, lonely, isolated or living with a long-term health condition this could be the course for you."

Participants in the programme, which will run on Wednesday mornings across January, February and March, will be given opportunities to work creatively with natural materials such as clay and leaves. And there will be walks, talks and moments of contemplation in the glorious

Purbeck countryside.

Sara said: "We are aiming to create a small, friendly, supportive and understanding group to help with stress reduction and build resilience. The focus will be on self-care and fostering positive changes in day-to-day living."

Both Sara and Jane, who runs Jane Woods Coaching to "help people navigate the ups and downs of life," are active supporters of Planet Purbeck.

Jane said: "We hope this course will enable people to feel less alone and will provide strategies to boost wellbeing for those living in the Purbeck community."

The NHS's prevention plan seeks to reduce the burden on hospitals and other services by encouraging individuals to take action through supported self-management. A crucial part of the scheme involves funding local projects, in this case via the Dorset Community Foundation.

Planet Purbeck's co-leader Rob Waitt said: "It is an honour for us to be delivering such a course for the NHS, in which we all have a

stake. And we are confident those who take part in it will emerge with new hope for the future."

- Never leave items on charge when you are sleeping or when you are not at home.
- Don't overload sockets.






The Woolgarston Farms

Woolgarston, or Wolston, was divided up into the east and the west parts with both lying in the Hundred of Ailwood; the western section became called Little Woolgarston. In July 1919 both East and West Woolgarston encompassed the outlined area shown on the map below.



Land had been absorbed from Sandyhills Farm and Tabbits Hill Farm by 1919. The more southerly part of Woolgarston had been Common land, and this had been enclosed in 1731 producing a much larger area. The Anglo-Saxons created defined communal land, but the Domesday Book does not mention it as it was of little value to the crown.

By 1066, the Norman clerk recorded that the area had been divided up amongst five Thegns (no names are given). During the Anglo-Saxon period, if a man claimed the rank of Thegn, then he would hold about 5 hides of land but the clerk assessed the land here as '2 hides less 4 acres' (meaning 236 acres) and added that there was 8 acres of meadow, and pastureland a furlong wide (220 yards or, in Anglo Saxon terms, the length of a furrow in a 10-acre field) and ½ a league long (a league is defined as 3 miles). One gets the impression of a long strip of land - more research is needed here!

The suffix 'ton' (a settlement or farmstead) identifies the place as Anglo-Saxon and the name itself derives from a Thegn called Wulfgar, meaning Wolf-spear, who built his timbered farm here. Little is known about him as documentation is rather sparse during this period. Any mention of Woolgarston (however you spell it) jumps from 1086, the Domesday Book, to 1213, the Curia Regis Rolls. Interestingly, in the reign of Edward, the Elder, King of Wessex, a coin was minted by a Thegn called Wulfgar. Maybe this was the Wulfgar of Woolgarstone? Was he one of the two 'moneyers' who were permitted to mint coins in the Saxon 'burgh' of Wareham for trade? Possibly, but we may never know.

It's A Wonderful Life

As the seasons change, many of us find that the annual arrival of Christmas and the few days after is the passing of yet another year. For some, Christmas marks the passing of yet another year brimming with happy and joyful memories, whilst others remember only sadness and disappointment.
