

Enjoy a warm welcome with tea, coffee, and biscuits while exploring community stalls from Double Act, Corfe Castle Library, Guide Dogs, Citizens Advice, and Dorset Adventure Park to name just a few. To kick things off in style, the School Choir will be opening the event with a special performance!

Highways & Pavements: The Parish Council continues to advocate for essential road and pavement repairs, understanding that these are major concerns for our community. These types of footage provide valuable evidence, especially when it comes to demonstrating safety risks, particularly in situations where emergency vehicles could struggle to pass. By sharing your dash cam footage, you'll help strengthen our case for improvements and show that safety should be a top priority. Please send any relevant footage to the Clerk. Your contribution plays a vital role in ensuring our parish is safe and accessible for everyone. Thank you for your continued support! **Dorset Council Updates:** Cllr Wilson shared several key developments:

- Dorset Council's budget for 2025-26 has been released, showing how public funds will be spent. For more detail go to https://www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/news/council-approves-a-balanced-budgetset-against-increased-national-pressures
- Dorset Council is currently running two public consultations: 1 Dorset Open Land (2) PSPO, which aims to extend controls on the lighting of fires on open land, particularly in areas of open health land. 2 Dorset Beaches (Studland) PSPO, which aims to extend the control of camping on beaches to Studland Beach. Both consultations close on 20th April 2025, and everyone is encouraged to have their say. To have your say on the Dorset Open Land consultation please visit https://consultation.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/c-e/olpspo To have your say on the Dorset Beaches (Studland) PSPO please visit https://www.dorsetcouncil.gov.uk/news/views-sought-on-new-measures-to-

**Traffic Management:** The council decided against commissioning a traffic survey for a possible new Speed Indicator Device location, in line with the advice received from Dorset Council Road Safety team.

Pavement Repairs Update: A working group has been formed to assess the pavement repair needs within our community, beginning with East Street and The Square. While this does not mean repairs will start at once, it is an ongoing project that the Parish Council is undertaking to advocate for higher-quality materials. The goal is to encourage Dorset Council to use replacement stone rather than cement or tarmac when repairing the pavements, ensuring a more durable and aesthetically pleasing result that aligns with the character of our parish.

Strategic Action Plan: The council's new action plan has been approved and will be reviewed quarterly. The new document will be launched during the Annual Public Meeting on May 19th.

Kingston Salt Bin Relocation: The Kingston Salt Bin will soon be relocated to a more practical and accessible location, directly opposite its current spot, next to the general waste bin that is currently in place. This move should make it easier for residents to access when needed.

**Get Involved! Your input matters!** Whether it's sharing concerns, attending meetings, or participating in consultations, your involvement helps shape the future of Corfe Castle Parish. Keep an eye on our website and social media for updates, and don't hesitate to get in touch with any queries or suggestions.

**Next Council Meeting:** Monday 14<sup>th</sup> April 2025, at 7pm in the Corfe Castle Village Hall, Bill Carter Room. To start the meeting is a public session, so please come and join us and have your say.

# **Environmental Group Update**



Here comes Spring, and with it we are launching a new series of events! What we have confirmed dates for so far are:

## Thursday 17th April at Mortons Manor Hotel at 7pm

Richard Caldow of the Swanage and Purbeck Swift Group is coming to talk to us about swifts and how we might help stop or reverse the decline in the numbers of these summer visitors by providing suitable new nesting sites. The Swift Group has already installed swift boxes in St Nicholas Church Tower in Worth Matravers in anticipation of these birds arriving in early May, and it would be great to do something similar in Corfe Castle and Kingston ready for them in 2026.

## Wednesday 7th May meet at West Street Car Park at 8pm

Join us and the National Trust as we head to Corfe Common to see (hear!) bats! The National Trust will bring their audible bat detectors and use these not only to locate the bats but also hopefully to identify what species they are. We are also going to try to borrow a thermal imaging device so we can actually visually track the bats as they fly past us – great fun!

## Friday 6th June meet at Corfe Castle Village Square at 7pm

As a follow up to Richard's April talk, we will be hosting a swift spotting walk around Corfe Castle village led by both Richard and Julie Hatcher of the Swift Group, and as part of this will investigate if we can identify any suitable sites for swift nest boxes.

## **Events still in the planning stage:**

**Late May** – a plant survey of the "wild" bank on the right hand side of God's Acre to compare with our 2023 survey.

June / July – walk and picnic on the Common

October - fungi spotting walk. November - hedge / tree planting session(s).

## Happy Easter

## Mysterious letters and numbers high within the Keep.

The Kings' View platform not only offers us new external vistas but also close-ups of the walls and architecture of the Keep and South Annex.

We have noticed some mysterious carvings in the stone beside the Kings' appearance door (see photo). Could you help us decipher them? We wonder if they might be numbers and letters (18LL?), but they aren't

## 2<sup>nd</sup> Tower conservation works



As you are aware, we are continuing with conservation works at the castle, currently focusing on the walls and tumbles.

We recently removed vegetation covering the 2nd tower, uncovering significant ivy growth within the structure. The roots have pushed stones and parts of the wall out of alignment, necessitating the removal of sections of the tower to clear the roots before repositioning the stones back to their original place. Due to the tower's location and angle on the mound, a scaffolding rig needs to be built to support the stones while they are being

lifted, which you will see if you regularly use the Woodland Walk.

## **Nature updates from the National Trust**



Nature's chorus on the common Now's the time to get out onto the commons and listen to nature's symphony. The dawn chorus is performed by birds looking for

love, and to defend their patch. It starts at sunrise, and the loudest singers are the males.

Thrushes, blackbirds and robins are among the first to rise, then others gradually join in — wrens, chiffchaffs, blackcaps and willow warblers. On the common, you might also be lucky enough to hear a yellowhammer, linnet or stonechat. If you're not an early riser, remember there's the dusk chorus too. It might

not be quite so loud, but guaranteed to soothe your soul!

#### Beaver fever!

In March, we released two pairs of beavers into Little Sea, Studland. Purbeck was the first place in England to be granted a government licence for a 'wild' beaver release like this – and the story attracted the attention of national TV, radio and newspapers.

The new beavers now join the family that arrived there in 2024 by unknown means – so hopefully we'll have the start of a viable population. By creating sunny glades, new water channels and deep pools, the beavers will enhance the habitat for lots of other species, especially dragonflies, wetland birds. amphibians, bats and water voles.

Beavers are a native species and were present across the country – but were hunted to extinction in the UK around 400 years ago. So we are thrilled to welcome them back! You can read more here:

## **Church Knowle Parish Council**

The March meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council took place in the Church Knowle Village Hall on Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> March 2025 at 6:30pm. It was attended by six members of the Council (Cllr Burt in the chair), four members of the public and the Dorset ward councillor Ben Wilson.

The main items of interest in the meeting were:

<u>Damage to the Tracks along the top of the Church Knowle Hills by Off-Road Vehicles</u>

There was an extensive discussion with a presentation of research to date into this problem and the interested bodies and authorities who are monitoring this. The Parish Council fully supports all actions to stop this damage and misuse of these Rights of Way.

It appears that there is a perception among off road enthusiasts that this area is a legitimate public arena. It is not. The public have the right to pass along these tracks, they are Unsurfaced Rights of Way, but not to leave the track and trespass on adjoining land. This is further reinforced by the protected areas, monuments and nesting areas on this adjoining land. The penalties for trespass onto it and causing damage are severe.

In order to notify off road enthusiasts of the status of the area and the prohibitions against damage and trespass, signage at key points is proposed. This is a preliminary to action being taken by the Police and environmental agencies who are now monitoring the site.

#### Tree Work at Cotness Lakes

A question about the tree work at the Cotness Lakes was asked by a member of the public. The parish council is satisfied that this is now being done in co-ordination with the proper authorities and there are no outstanding concerns.

## The Neighbourhood Plan

This is progressing again under the new chair of the Steering Committee, Mrs Pippa Edwards and there will be a parish wide housing needs survey distributed to every household soon.

## Report from Dorset Councillor

Dorset Council has published a breakdown of its £417m budget. This can be seen on the Parish Council website under Information→Notices.

There is a public consultation about Public Space Protection Orders for Studland Beach and Open Heathland to prevent camping and wildfires.

Natural England are undertaking a deer drone survey to assess the extent of the wild deer population and measures to control this.

#### The Corfe River

Even though Wessex Water have had their capital budget cut they are committed to providing the additional storage at the local treatment works required to prevent the sewage overspill into the river. There will be a tour of one of these treatment works in April.

#### Vacancies on the Parish Council

There is still one vacancy on the council which has a full strength of nine and any interested parishioners can apply to clerk@churchknowle-pc.gov.uk.

The meeting finished at 7:53 pm. The next meeting of the Church Knowle Parish Council will be at the Furzebrook Village Hall at 6:30 on 8<sup>th</sup> April 2025.

This year, Jo led a team that provided a morning enabling children to Experience Easter as six interative stations that explored the Easter narrative and unpacked the key themes further.



## **News from the Library**

We have two events this month! Richard Caldow (remember the talk about Corfe's swifts last year?) returns to talk to us about the plight of the Purbeck puffins on Friday 11<sup>th</sup>



April. The following day Barry is running a **Quiz Night** to raise funds for the library and the resurfacing of the village school playground.

## The Plight of the Purbeck Puffins

Everyone loves a puffin, but this charismatic species is "vulnerable to extinction" according to the International Union for the Conservation of Nature. The puffin population in the UK has declined by c25% since 2000. In Dorset, puffin numbers have fallen even more dramatically and over many decades. We have only three pairs left in Purbeck and perhaps one pair on Portland. These are special birds - the only puffins breeding on the English coast between the Isles of Scilly and Yorkshire.

The reason for puffins' decline in Dorset is unknown but failure to breed successfully is a likely cause. Is that true though, and if so, why? Following in the footsteps of the late Trev Haysom, Richard Caldow, with help from the National Trust and the Dorset Wildlife Trust and a team of volunteers has been studying the Purbeck puffins since 2023 to try to get to the bottom of the mystery of Purbeck's declining puffins.

If you want to learn more about puffins, come along to the Library in Corfe Castle at 2.00pm on Friday 11th April to listen to Richard present a host of interesting facts about puffins and the results of all the work that is being done to try to find the reason for the decline of Dorset's puffins.

## Tabbit's Hill Farm, West Woolgarston

At the most westerly end of Woolgarston, lies a hotchpotch of fields which includes Tabbit's Hill Farm. The first mention of '*Tappette Hayes in Wulgarston*' is in a survey of 1572 for the Manor of Eastington. One William Gover held the farm then and it descended to George Gover and then Thomas Gover. By 1586, '*Tabbotes Hill*' is shown on Treswell's map (the farm is not shown in the correct place plus the lane only seems to go to Westwood Farm).




Ralph Treswell's map of 1586 showing 'Tabbotes hill' with 'Sewell's Land' close to Barneswood.

In 1614, Robert Culliford of Encombe and his wife, Margaret, sold part of '*Tappetts Hill*' to David Grove of Eastington for £260 (about £35,000 in today's money). The Groves continued to hold the farm tenancy well into the late 18<sup>th</sup> century and it then passed to Mr Henry Mate of Bere Regis and was called '*Tabbets Hill*'. Mr Mate acquired the land on marriage to Honor Grove, the sister of David Grove (a grandson of the David Grove of Eastington).

'Sewells Land' appears on the Treswell map. On a late 17<sup>th</sup> century deed, the surname is spelt Seward alias Sewell meaning that two surnames had been used. There could be various reasons for that for example a mother's remarriage or an inheritance from a female relative. Anyway, in 1603, the land that Thomas and Margaret Seward had inherited was purchased by George Bullocke. Part of this land is now held by the Corfe Castle Charities. Come the 19<sup>th</sup> century four owners held these lands – John Hales Calcraft, the Corfe Castle Charities, the Earl of Ilchester and Elizabeth Spencer. Calcraft leased some of the fields here from the Earl of Ilchester for Brenscombe Farm.

Captain Guy Marston sold off Tabbit's Hill Farm in 1919. By then, the farm comprised 56a. 2r. 28p., a farmhouse with 4 bedrooms, stabling for 6 horses, a barn, granary, pig styes and stalls for 10 cows with a calving house.


#### Fund-raising news

#### **Revd Richard writes**

Eighty years ago, on 9<sup>th</sup> April 1945, less than a month before VE day, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a Lutheran Pastor was murdered by the Nazi police in Flossenburg concentration camp. He had been a leading light in the "Confessing Church", a movement which opposed Nazism. Bonhoeffer, who had been banned from teaching, and harassed by the Nazis was on an international lecture tour when war broke out. He bravely returned to Germany where he continued to speak

out against the evils of Hitler's regime, living out his conviction that, "Silence in the face of evil is itself evil: God will not hold us guiltless. Not to speak is to speak. Not to act is to act". As a result he was arrested in 1943 and imprisoned until his execution.

Bonhoeffer's writings have had a profound impact over the past eighty years and continue to inspire and challenge as he offers radical and uncompromising perspectives on following the example and teachings of Jesus and living together in community. In fact a new film of his life has just come out. Hopefully it will appear soon in a cinema near us.

He wrote provocatively that "The person who loves their dream of community will destroy community but the person who loves those around them will create community". In other words our ideals of living in easy-to-maintain harmony with all can cause us to reject the reality of those around us who, let's be honest, are just as mixed up and messed up and irritating as we ourselves are! For Bonhoeffer, the foundation for caring for one another is that "God loves human beings. God loves the world. Not an ideal human, but human beings as they are; not an ideal world, but the real world"

As Easter approaches, it reminds us of the cost of that love at the cross and the triumph of that love at the empty tomb. I want it to take root ever more deeply in my heart and mind so that I have a deeper sense and experience of the love God has for the real world, the real me and the real you.

#### **STEPS FOR STAN**

It's been a few years since any news of Stan has been sent out. Stan will become a teenager (aaargh!) in July! He attends The Victoria Education Centre in Poole, travelling in a taxi with his beloved driver Jamie, playing music full blast! He is still thoroughly enjoying life - always smiling and extremely loving.

By the time you read this Stan will have had surgery on his legs at Southampton hospital.. This was to lengthen the muscles in his calves and hamstrings. The aim of this surgery is to enable Stan to stand up straighter so we can continue with standing transfers and hold off the need for using a hoist.

As Stan has grown his muscles haven't, as he doesn't use them much, which has resulted in them getting tighter. Being on his tiptoes has increased as well as limiting how much he can straighten at his knees and hips. He will be in double leg casts with braces that force his legs out straight for six weeks. Physiotherapy started the day after his operation and will need to continue every day at school and at home, along with being in his standing frame.

With all this going on we will be looking at doing some fundraising again with Just4Children to help with extra physio we need to do outside of school. When he is out of casts we want to get him a wheelchair that is better suited for him than his standard nhs one, together with an off-road wheel for rough ground. ## Towards a New Model of Day Opportunities - Consultation goes live

A three-month consultation on a new way of delivering day opportunities across Dorset has gone live today (11 March).

The Hub and Spoke Day Opportunities Model consultation, which will run until 9 June, looks at changing the way that Dorset delivers day services by providing a network of core hubs in each area of the county that will support activities within local communities, reducing the need for people to travel, sometimes considerable distances, to reach daily activities and support that will instead now be provided within villages and towns.

The "spokes" represent the vast range of different organisations, charities, churches, projects and activities that already take place across the county by our providers and micro-providers, including walking groups, swimming, volunteering, gardening, performing arts, lunch clubs and knit and natter groups. They will be supported by the work of the hubs in connecting people and providing support and advice to strengthen their offer.

There will also be several specialist services, which may be based in either the hubs or in the community that will support people with speech and language therapy, specialist equipment and facilities, hoists and sensory rooms.

The consultation follows extensive engagement in 2021 and 2023 about what people wanted from their day opportunities where people told us that they wanted to have choice in the things that they can do with their day, were keen to be able do activities in the evenings and weekends and wanted to try new hobbies with support outside of the traditional day centres environment.

Councillor Steve Robinson, Cabinet Portfolio lead for Adult Social Care, said the proposals would give people greater choice and opportunity, moving beyond existing and traditional provision, whilst still providing bespoke support services for those with more complex needs.

"This consultation is a key strand within our vision of Communities For All. It aims to provide a large variety of choices to everyone who finds themselves in need of support whilst also reducing travel and helping local charities and groups provide the services that are needed in each community.

"We want to help every town and village have its own local offer, tailored to its local needs and aim to reduce the need for sometimes old and draughty buildings that are no longer fit for purpose.

"Through our Stakeholder Advisory Group we have been talking to the voluntary, community and social enterprise sectors around the design, development and delivery of new services as a key part of our future model.

We are committed to continuing those conversations in the coming months, whilst placing existing users and their carers at the core of our consultations.

"We want to see more organisations, projects and services offering the option to access sessions and activities through direct payments or individual service funds, which will enable people to have more choice, freedom and flexibility to choose their activities and support."

The consultation will involve face to face meetings across the county, as well as a series of online sessions with the first event taking place today at Stour Connect in Sturminster Newton.

## **The Rambling Gardener**

April is a lovely month with the deciduous plants growing fresh leaves; if it is cold many will emerge dark red and others a mixture of bright greens. Every plant, whether a tiny alpine or a large tree, leafs up at a different speed; nature is so beautiful, just take time to look. If you say "April" to me I think of April showers, Easter bunnies, children's Easter egg hunts, and warmer days. As a church goer I should think first of Christ's crucifixion and his rising on the third day, and as a gardener I will be praying for April showers to feed the plants as with the lovely sunny days in March and little rain for much of the month the ground could be dry.

Please avoid killing anything, nature can look after life better than we can. Like aphids, which are pests, but birds need aphids to feed their young. I keep some small ducks and hens, the small fluffy legged bantams do little damage to my plants and keep the slugs and snails at bay. A few slugs are needed to clean up algae on paths and eat unhealthy plants, and it is great having fresh eggs. A fresh egg cooked with a little butter and garlic is an enjoyable breakfast.

It is wonderful to read the Woodland Trust review for last year and see how many people are supporting their work to get protection for old trees and managing the trees to be safe and live longer. Layering the trees usually makes them put out new shoots that last for many years, and in wet years plants put on a lot of growth that they can't support in dry years so long-lived plants like trees and bushes benefit from hard pruning. Some trees need pruning at specific times of year, so do check before you cut, and if it is a big tree then get in a trained tree surgeon who knows what to do safely.

If you have less birds than usual it may be because a garden near you has had a makeover. If you are planning a makeover save money, work with nature, and take time to alter the garden. This year I must replace some rotten timbers in the garden. I will use old Purbeck stone at ground level, with wood above. The rotten wood will be stacked where it can be left for wildlife and rot down to feed the soil over the years.

It is best to turn the soil as little as possible, but last year the convolvulus swamped some plants so before the ground gets hard try and dry fork out any roots you can find - their roots are yellow, so easy to see. I have trouble from ground elder which spreads from the smallest bit of root so I don't put it on the compost heap, but I burn it. If you have a council green waste bin it can go in

that as they make their composts much hotter than a home garden compost which does kill the ground elder.

April is a busy time in the vegetable garden. All hardy seeds can be sown, put in more seeds than required as spares, but don't overcrowd them. Peas, broad beans, spring onions, broccoli, beetroot and cabbage can be started off, but it is best to plant in sheltered areas until May. Courgettes, winter squash, peppers, cucumbers tomatoes (blight resistant if possible) can all be brought on inside at 20°C when started and then slowly harden off. Do try something new each year as a few different things can be interesting. Do make nettle soup and then wild garlic soup, both are very tasty, cheap and easy to collect in spring.

Have a good April, enjoy all the things in your garden.

#### **CONCERT AT WORTH MATRAVERS**


