

DECEMBER FOR CORFE CASTLE PARISH COUNCIL

Kingston bus stop – I wish to start my article this month with an apology to all Kingston residents who were alarmed by last month's article, and to confirm Corfe Castle Parish Council have requested Dorset Council to investigate adding another bus stop outside of the Kingston Country Courtyard. There is no intention to move the existing bus stops.

Budget 2023 / **24** – Last month the Parish Council stated it wished to work towards a 0% increase on its precept for the next financial year, as we understand the cost-ofliving crisis is affecting so many people. Dorset Council have now released the Tax Base information required confirming as a Parish we have had a decrease in our Tax Base by 10.1 homes (1.48%). The decrease in the Tax Base means the Parish Council needed to reduce expenditure by £778 to keep a 0% increase in the Precept, which we are delighted to say we have managed to achieve without greatly affecting the work the Parish Council hopes to achieve in future years.

Annual Parish Meeting – The Annual Parish Meeting date and format has been set for 2023. The meeting will take place on the Monday 22nd May 2023 from 6pm in the Village Hall (Main Hall), (booking of the Village Hall with standing). The format will be very similar to previous years, where a few local groups will be invited to give a 3-minute presentation showcasing their group, followed by an update from the Parish Council on the work we have achieved this year and future plans, followed by questions from the Members of the Public. The Annual Parish Meeting is your opportunity to let us know what projects you would like to see the Parish Council investigate. Any local group wishing to showcase their group should contact the Clerk via email, spaces will be limited to 6 groups maximum.

Gods Acre rules and regulations – Following the adoption of the new Rules and Regulations document for Gods Acre Cemetery, Corfe Castle Parish Council will in early 2023, be carrying out a clearance within Gods Acre of any item which is deemed to be in breach of these rules. All items will be placed to one side near the pedestrian entrance in the new extension area for the period of one month before being disposed of.

You can make a Difference: Councillors make a huge difference to the quality of life of local people and how local issues are dealt with. Council's need people from all backgrounds and experiences who reflect the communities they serve. In May 2024 Dorset will be holding the next local elections where your Parish Councillors will be elected. If you want to make a difference to your community, why not think about standing? You will need to start becoming aware of issues in your local area; what your local council is doing about these issues; come to a couple of our meetings, watch what it is all about, and if you feel you could make a difference think about standing.

Second homes

Legislation affecting second homes and holiday lets is currently being considered in Parliament in the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill. Corfe Castle PC put a motion to the annual conference of all Dorset Parish and Town Councils last month supporting the Bill and this was passed by a large majority.

Dorset Council Updates:

"Net zero target - The local authority published its third Climate and Ecological Emergency Strategy Progress Report outlining progress towards reducing carbon emissions. Since introducing their strategy in 2019, the carbon footprint of the council has reduced by 26 per cent and current data indicates we are on track to achieve their interim target of reducing council emissions by 40 per cent by 2025.

Helping vulnerable women - A project which will help vulnerable women in Dorset has come one step closer to realisation.

Dorset Council has appointed BCHA, a charitable housing association based in the southwest, to lead the Pause Programme. Pause is a nationally evaluated programme which works with women who have experienced, or are at risk of, repeated pregnancies that result in their children needing to be removed from their care. The programme aims to give women the opportunity to pause and take control of their lives, breaking a destructive cycle that causes both them and their children deep trauma. It supports them to develop new skills and responses that can help them create a more positive future.

Rough sleepers - Dorset Council has successfully secured more than £1.5 million to help continue excellent work supporting rough sleepers. As well as continuing to support existing projects, such as the Bus Shelter and our advice and support services, the additional funding will help establish a new rapid assessment unit for vulnerable people providing accommodation and bespoke assistance to prevent returning to the streets. Spread over three years the money will also be used to support charities in the community which are set up to help rough sleepers. The funds over such a significant period, will give security to the organisations and their workforces.

Land charges - Dorset Council has announced the time taken to complete land charge search requests is back down to 10 working days. A year ago the average time to return these searches had risen to 62 days which was holding up the sale of properties and in some cases led to the collapse of some sales."

Next council meeting – Monday 9th January 2023, at 7pm in the Corfe Castle Village Hall, Bill Carter Room. To start the meeting is a public half hour, so please come and join us and have your say.





Following numerous requests, we are pleased to announce that as of 1st Jan we will be re-introducing the face to face "sit and wait" service that we provided pre-COVID. For new patients that will not have used this option, the sit and wait clinic runs every weekday morning between 8.30-10.30 and is designed for more pressing medical problems that require same day assessment/treatment from a GP. Patients attend the surgery before 10.30 and are added to the clinic list and seen by the GP in a first come first served basis. Please be aware we are unable to specify which GP you will see that morning. The waiting room may also become quite busy so please be prepared that you may be asked to wait in your car.

You will still be required to wear a face covering or mask and if you have any respiratory symptoms you will need to advise the reception team at booking in and wait in your car.

We anticipate that the car park will be busier again so the need to use the pay and display will be higher, be prepared and bring some change or download the Just Park app beforehand.

The internal dispensary window will remain **closed** and we will continue to use the outside window, so please be careful of any extra cars whilst waiting and queue around the path.

Finally, as of January we will not be providing the telephone triage service so you will need to attend the surgery if you need to speak to a GP the same day or book a future dated routine appointment.

The CSW's are members of the Integrated team covering the whole of Purbeck providing hands- on- care and support to the patient and equally importantly to the relatives when patients wish to die at home.

We would like to wish all the patients and particularly Doctor Lepper and all his team a Very Happy and Healthy New Year.

Purbeck Heaths National Nature Reserve.

2022 has been a year of change across the Purbeck Heaths National Nature Reserve.

The creation of the large single grazing unit, (installing cattle grids across the roads and removing internal fences between Arne, Middlebere, Slepe, and Stoborough Heaths as well as Hartland Moor) was a big undertaking – funded by a range of bodies including Wytch Farm Landscape Enhancement Fund and the Green Recovery Challenge Fund. The infrastructure changes were needed to create both wilder landscape for people and wildlife. Pigs have been released into the area and it's been lovely to see how many people have enjoyed seeing them foraging wild in the landscape – creating valuable bare ground in the process. There are some extra ponies on the ground too now. Domestic grazing animals can now move freely almost from the A351 to Gold Point... something they haven't been able to do in living memory.

The livestock (cattle, ponies, donkeys and pigs) are there to do a conservation job – diversifying the vegetation structure and producing transient bare ground so that the area supports a wider range of wildlife as well as providing a habitat for the wildlife that feeds on and recycles their dung. We've noticed a few people who have taken to feeding the animals. Please don't do this, however nicely they 'ask' for titbits. If the animals are foraging from people they aren't doing their job and, even worse, they take to pestering other visitors some of whom won't welcome the contact. Please just enjoy the animals in the landscape.

We've worked behind the scenes too, creating new signage, leaflets and a website. If you haven't already, check out purbeckheaths.org.uk.

To monitor the impact of the new grazing regime we've created a new naturalists' association – the Purbeck Natural History Forum – to coordinate the massive amount of citizen science occurring across the heaths.

We've also created a sustainable tourism plan for the landscape – and have a broad group continuing to work together with representatives of local businesses, NGOs, landowners, and residents. More details of this are on the website.

Over at Shell Bay at the north-eastern edge of the NNR we've installed a wader fence, to provide wintering populations of wading birds a space away

from people and dogs – trying to balance the needs of nature with the needs of people.

2023 looks like to be a year of consolidation across the heaths – we'll look to provide regular updates here. But do take a moment to think about what we can see now – ospreys and sea eagles in the harbour, a more open wilder landscape with more natural processes within the heaths – and both enjoy the present but also think of an even wilder future for one of the most nature rich parts of the U.K.

Ramblings of a local gardener.

Wishing you a good 2023 and may your new year wishes come true. I must not tell anyone my wish, but I do hope by the end of 23 I don't have to buy anything wrapped in man-made material that is going to hurt the environment. What incredible events Purbeck put on in December; people cooked good food for coffee mornings, many people sang for us inside and out, others arranged walks and did plays. A thank you goes to every one of them that put in their time and money.

The sudden freeze in December took me by surprise; I had hoped for some cold weather to keep things healthy but was not expecting a week of freezing weather. Plants can acclimatise to cold if it comes slowly, but that freezing weather was a shock to many species.

In 1963 at the end of December we had freezing snow with an east wind that blew the snow into drifts. It filled the road to the east and did not thaw out until the end of March. At the farm we had to dig out a 23-foot drift to get out of the farm. To avoid throwing away all our cows' milk we took churns of milk down the fields to Swanage and then along the cleared main road to a milk collection point in Corfe as the milk tankers were unable to get to the farms. Also, our water supply froze up, and for more than a month our family, including three children under six and a baby born in early January, had only 10 gallons a day of usable water. I wonder what 2023 will bring us.

In January there are important jobs to do on good days outside in a green house, porch or garage such as mixing compost for potting, sowing early plants like love-in-a-mist, hollyhocks, foxgloves and many early vegetables, or removing any dead leaves on plants to decrease the build-up of infective agents like rust spots.

A very important job is sitting in a warm room dreaming and planning for the coming year and looking through seed and plant catalogues. Look out of your windows and see where winter flowering plants or interesting foliage are needed for the next winter, and talk to neighbours if that is where your windows look. There are many plants, from the 2" high alpine saxifrage to trees like the little *prunus autumnalis*, that can flower much of the winter.


Think especially about planting bulbs to give colour all year in beds, pots and hanging baskets both inside the house and out. Having plants to look after will keep you challenged, happy and healthy.

Sowing seeds is the cheapest way to keep a garden full although it is tempting to buy plants that someone else has started and one can get almost instant

vegetables and foliage or flowers. If you order in January, you will have a better selection, but any bare-rooted trees, shrubs, and plants can be ordered up to April.

I hope that you have had a wonderful festive season and that you are looking forward to the coming year. Rachel.



Mr Parmiter of Bushey

The December CVN mentioned Mr Robert Parmiter (his surname is spelt in a variety of ways), a yeoman, making sure that his neighbour, Edmund Uvedale, knew where their shared boundary lay in 1588 between Grimberry and Bushey Heaths. By August 1611, Robert was dead; he died intestate and since the burial records of Corfe don't exist at this date, this is the only record of his death. As was normal at this time, an inventory was taken listing what he owned and the total cost of all his worldly goods which stood at £163 6s. 6d. (about £22,000 today).

The inventory starts with the value of his crops; his two closes of wheat being the most valuable at over £6. The rest of the land grew rye, barley, oats and peas. It then turns to what was in his house which had a chimney, a hall, and a chamber within the hall (most likely the bedroom / private space), a kitchen and then various outbuildings which may have been attached to the main building or reachable by a covered passage – buttery, dairy house and a well house which had 3 pigs and bees in it. He had 6 horses, a bull, 8 oxen, over 27 cattle, 60 sheep and various agricultural implements. It also notes that he had 6 silver spoons, a cheese vat and press but no books or rugs. By the 16th century, many traditional houses had added a chimney and a chamber over the hall, but the Parmiters had just divided their hall with no upper floor. However, they had acquired 2 bedsteads with featherbeds so didn't have to sleep upon straw pallets as their ancestors would have done. The house sounds basic, but it had a high degree of domestic comfort for the period and the basic lay out may have looked like the one shown below. The chimney is likely to have been placed at a corner of the building to assist with holding up the roof.




Robert's father, Walter, had purchased this property from Thomas Hardy, and his son Robert, of Afflington, in 1551. So where was this property? In 1772 there are two houses mentioned which had belonged to the Parmiters at Bushey. The then owner, John Calcraft, rented it to William Edmonds and the house had merged with his tenement ($N^{os.}$ 60 & 64 on Samuel Donne's map shown below). $N^{o.}$ 64 had an orchard.



And another map (D-RWR/P/5) shows the property in 1805. N°. 64 is still the same 40 years later, but an outbuilding has been removed at N°. 60.



By the time the first OS map was surveyed, the barn had gone at $N^{0.64}$, and further alterations were made to the property in the 20^{th} century. See the National Library of Scotland website on https://maps.nls.uk/view/101447357



It is now the Purbeck Cider Company and more fruit trees have been planted – a nice nod to the memory of the old orchard. Louise Haywood

The Reverend Anne Bond writes:

I hope you all had a wonderful Christmas and wish you a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year.

The new year always feels to me like a fresh start. *This* year I'll get rid of some of my books ... tidy my office ... get down to what I regard as a reasonable weight. *This* year I'll get something right ... you get the idea. And when these new year resolutions crumble into dust, I feel a failure.

But realistically, what has changed? Nothing. I'm still the person I was last year. Neither God nor my friends have consigned me to the fires of hell, cast me into outer darkness, or cut themselves off from association with me. So *that's* all right then: I can face this new year with confidence, despite my failures.

The defining characteristic of God is love; love for everything he has created and love for every person who has ever been born. Last month we celebrated the birth of Jesus, the new-born baby who would grow to become the greatest and most extraordinary human being ever to exist; who, despite total innocence, allowed himself to die a criminal's death mysteriously for the sake of others, and yet was seen by many to be alive walking, talking and eating, for a period of six weeks after his death; and who left behind him a forceful, powerful, personal influence in peoples' minds and hearts that still exists today, known as the Holy Spirit.

The resurrection of Jesus – his presence alive after his death on a Roman execution cross – has never been disproved. Many explanations have been put forward, but none of them proven. Like God himself, it is a mystery – and (speaking for myself) I am content with not understanding, but simply accepting.

God is indeed a mystery. From the earliest times of pre-history mankind has worshiped 'God' under many names and in many guises. To us, in our neck of the woods, in this 21st century, some of the ways may seem absurd or even evil. However, it is not for us to judge; if God exists at all (and, as you know, I'm pretty certain he does!) that's *his* job. Ours is to seek to obey Jesus' commandments to 'love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength' and to 'love your neighbour as yourself'. Whatever we attempt, aim for, achieve, or look back on, if we can honestly affirm that these fundamentals have backed or formed or been taken account of in all our doings, however feeble, we shall have done our bit to demonstrate life on Earth within the Kingdom of God, life within God's recipe for peace-incommunity.

However, what if we can't be sure and have an uneasy feeling we may have failed somewhat? As I wrote earlier, the defining characteristic of God is love; so admit your failure to him and he will set you right and bless you with a cleansing flood of forgiveness.

Talking to God may feel like talking to yourself - you may feel foolish. But persevere, and before you have realised it is happening, you will find it has become something else altogether: it develops into a conversation in which you try to put into words whatever it is you are trying to express, and you get back understanding, realisation, response, solution ... answers expressed mostly without words, sometimes even subliminally, that nevertheless fulfil your present need. It doesn't always happen; but it does often. It's a bit like learning a new language, and it is amazingly rewarding, unlike anything experienced in the usual ordinary communication that happens between friends and relations and colleagues in the course of everyday life.

Happy New Year To All!

My name is Sam Connor, I have recently moved into the village with my wife Katie. We are so excited to be living here. Those I have met have been truly welcoming, I am humbled and thankful for the kindness we have been shown. I haven't always been a Christian; in fact I was quite the opposite for the first 30 odd years of my life. My life was all sorts of up in the air and crazy. I remember watching the news and thinking 'what's going on here?' it's not just me that is up in the air, it's the whole Earth, humanity. We often say things like 'the worlds gone mad!' Don't we? Well, in a nutshell, yes, I think it has. However, I want to encourage you today that there is hope. A hope based on promises. Not promises like we make that can be broken, but eternal promises that have already been kept, checked and proven.

It's the time of year again where we all make promises to ourselves about how we are going to live the next 12 months. My New Year's resolution is to start running again. I am absolutely optimistic I will succeed beyond February... This time. As I think about the number of times, I have made promises and broken them I do cringe at myself a little bit. Maybe this year will be different. I do wish you all the best in achieving yours!

Did you know that in the Bible, God makes many promises? Well, He does, In fact He makes thousands throughout the pages of both the Old and New Testaments. But does He keep them? Today let's just have a look at a couple of them. Before we do I first I want to tell you about a couple of things that have happened over the last couple of weeks:

It never ceases to amaze me the lies I hear about the content of the Bible. I asked a friend this week if he was thinking about Christianity at all. He replied by sending me a video with the caption 'this is what I believe about Christianity,' - I won't go into the details of the video but to tell you that it was by a well-known philosopher and contained within it some shocking lies about Christians and the Bible. It made me start thinking about my friend. He had not read the Bible but had accepted this other person's view on it as true. In fact, he was now refusing to read the Bible because he 'felt he had no need after watching the video'.

I recall another time talking to a work colleague about my little sister. The colleague stood there and nodded and asked questions about my sister. I told her that my sister was kind and caring. I realised at that moment that the colleague had never met my sister, nor had she seen her. In fact, she had no reason to believe in her existence but by my telling her and describing her. You'll be relieved to know that I do have a sister and I wasn't lying, her name is Cindy.

The purpose of those stories was to show that we can both blindly believe, and we can be drawn into believing things that aren't necessarily true. So, my first encouragement for this New Year would be: Why not give a go of reading the Bible yourself this year. I am not encouraging you to believe in my words, but to check it out for yourselves. Discovering some of God's promises for yourself.

We are running a Christianity Explored Course in February where you can do just that. We will spend time together looking at the Gospel of Mark, enjoying soup and bread and generally discussing what the Bible actually says.

Let's look at just a few of those promises that may surprise you!

In the Old Testament book of Isaiah, written about 700 years before the coming of Jesus, God promises to send a saviour, Isaiah even mentions one or two things about this Saviour and what will happen to him and why. But what does Isaiah say and did this promise come true? Well, shall we take a look:

Isaiah 53:4-5

Surely He took up our pain, and bore our suffering, yet we considered Him punished by God, stricken by Him, and afflicted. But He was pierced for our transgressions, He was crushed for our iniquities;

the punishment that brought us peace was on Him,

So, hang on; 700 years before Jesus came, we are told that he will come? We're told He will take our suffering away? Take our pain? Will he bring us peace? It even says 'He was pierced for our transgressions' That part is the single most important part in the Christian faith. The Bible teaches that we are in rebellion against God, that we all break His rules (this is called sin) and that we all deserve punishment for that. Now, I know I do. I have lied and stolen and done all sorts of terrible things in my life, my conscience tells me so and when I look around the world today and watch the news, I see that something isn't right, it's us! However, there is some AMAZING news, here you can see a promise made by God that our deserved punishment will be laid on another. History tells us that this saviour did come and he was 'pierced for our transgressions' - His name was Jesus and through repenting (changing our mind) of our sin and believing in him, we can be forgiven and be given the gift of eternal life. Did God fulfil his promise? Yes, He did and history provides our evidence.

Now, let's look at a final two verses, one which is in the New Testament and has promises within it. It is a favourite of mine and sums up my relationship with Jesus perfectly. A relationship that is open to all and free to all to receive.

'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest, take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls' Matthew 11:28-29

This is a part of a talk Jesus was having with people in Galilee. These are Jesus' words, as recorded by Matthew, an eye witness. But within them are several promises to the people. Jesus says that anyone that comes to him, he will give rest. He tells us he is referring to rest for our souls. He tells us that we can learn from him and that he is gentle and humble in heart. Wow! What massive claims. I know it says that, but is it true? Well, I can vouch for him, as I can vouch for my sister. Millions of Christians throughout the ages and alive today, will also tell you the same. Why can I/they tell you this? Because we know him. He promises personal relationship, look, see above 'take my yoke

upon you and learn from me' - He teaches us through his Word, The Bible. So, come and see what all the fuss is about and learn about God and how he keeps His promises in Jesus.
